

Superintendent: County Can Handle Kirwan Costs

St. Mary's Schools Superintendent J. Scott Smith told county commissioners Tuesday that the increases demanded by the Kirwan Commission recommendations for state education improvement are something the county has proven it can afford

Smith, who spoke critically of the Kirwan plan, which would further solidify state control over local education practices as well as increase costs, said that since the Commissioners of St. Mary's County had budgeted above maintenance of effort for schools for years, the incremental costs could be more readily absorbed.

"If Kirwan passes [the Maryland General Assembly] you won't have to substantially change how you've done business," Smith said during a joint meeting of the Board of Education and the county commissioners in Leonardtown. "But the best decisions are best made closest to the classroom.

"No money comes to anyone without strings attached."

According to a local school system analysis of Kirwan Commission recom-

mendations, the county's local contribution to the education budget would be \$109.5 million in fiscal 2021, compared to \$106.2 million for fiscal 2020, the current fiscal year.

For fiscal 2022 the local contribution would increase to \$112.9 million and then to \$116.6 million in 2023.

This would be an approximately 3 percent increase each year, the analysis stated

Local contributions to the school system have increased from \$76 million in fiscal 2011 to \$106 million in fiscal 2020, school system figures showed.

The Kirwan Commission recommendations call for an increase of \$ 4 billion dollars by 2030 for education funding statewide; the five focus areas of these proposed spending increases are early childhood education, nurturing high-quality teachers and leaders, making students ready for college and career readiness, increasing access to resources for student success and governance and accountability.

While the state teachers' union and Democratic leadership in the General Assembly have lauded the spending proposals as a victory for educational equity, Gov. Larry Hogan and some local leaders have decried the plans as a spending spree with very little accountability for student achievement.

Underpinning the major spending increases would likely be tax increases,

some who oppose the plan have stated publicly.

Local salary costs under the Kirwan plan could mean an additional \$16.4 million in salary step and cost of living increases if the increases were not restricted, Smith's analysis showed, from 2022 to 2024.

Smith said that there was much confusion about how the spending increases would be implemented as well as how governance and accountability would be established.

"If you have questions, I very possibly don't have an answer," Smith said to county commissioners.

School Board Member Cathy Allen said she some of the claims the Kirwan Commission made, particularly about millions of dollars in savings that could be had from reducing the number of special needs students, to result from a two-year education reform push.

Commissioner Eric Colvin called such projections "ridiculous."

"If we could've done this in two years, wouldn't we have done it already?" Allen said.

St. Mary's Key to National Heritage Designation

Lucille Walker, director of the Southern Maryland Heritage Area, came to the Commissioners of St. Mary's County Tuesday to gain support for a proposal to make Southern Maryland a National Heritage Area.

If successful, Walker said, it would only be the second national heritage area in Maryland and would join just 56 other such areas around the nation.

The goal, she said, was to make Southern Maryland an even more well-known destination for tourists and visitors, eager to explore its rich history.

"It's time to raise our national profile," Walker told county commissioners at their Tuesday meeting. "You're the first commissioner board I'm speaking to."

There were multiple reasons to pursue a federal designation as a National Heritage Area, Walker said, with many stemming from St. Mary's County itself.

Maryland started in St. Mary's City as an English colony in 1634 and it was also the first time in what would become America when a person of African descent, the Portuguese navigator Mathias de Souza, held a seat in the colony's legislature.

It was also the first time in the New World when a woman, Margaret Brent, petitioned the colonial leaders to allow her the right to vote, Walker said.

Perhaps most importantly, she said, St. Mary's County and Southern Maryland was the birth-place of religious freedom in the colonies.

Federal funds to seek the designation were now available, Walker said, and it was important to start soon as lawmakers at the federal level had the final decision; she said the region's federal delegation of legislators was supportive of the effort.

"It will take an act of Congress," Walker said.

She said the national heritage designation could be useful to boost Southern Maryland's profile for the state's 400th anniversary, which is 14 years hence.

The Southern Maryland Heritage Area's mission is to promote the region and bring in grant money that can be used to preserve historically significant buildings or items.

So far, in fiscal 2020, the heritage consortium has brought in \$128,570 in capital and non-capital grants for St. Mary's and \$331,000 for all of Southern Maryland.

Walker said the Southern Maryland Heritage area has been able to bring in triple the amount of grants in the last three years.

Woman Jailed on First Degree Murder Charge

A Washington, D.C. woman indicted by the Grand Jury in September for a homicide she allegedly committed in Chaptico, but whose indictment was only unsealed in late November when she was arrested on a first-degree murder warrant, remains incarcerated in the county detention center on a no-bond status.

Marlaena Rochelle Bethea, 46, of Oxon Hill allegedly stabbed and killed Michael Ross Bethea, 47, at a family gathering in Chaptico this past spring.

According to sheriff's office information on May 26, at approximately 11:20 p.m. deputies responded to the 35800 block of Bay Drive for a reported stabbing. Lifesaving measures were attempted by responding officers and emergency personnel, but Michael Bethea was pronounced deceased on the scene.

Preliminary investigation determined the victim was involved in a family dispute, and was subsequently stabbed outside the residence, detectives reported.

Commissioners Approve Water, Sewer for Hollywood Project

A small, proposed commercial development on Mervell Dean Road in Hollywood, known as Hollywood Square, received inclusion in the county's comprehensive water and sewer plan (CWSP) after the Commissioners of St. Mary's County approved the amendment at their Tuesday meeting.

The vote was passed by a 3-to-1 vote, with Commissioner Todd Morgan in opposition.

The developer of the project wants to build three shops on a .64-acre parcel bounded by the intersections of Route 235 and Mervell Dean Road with Clark's Landing Road.

Last month the county Board of Appeals voted by a 3-to-2 margin to approve variances for the project that much reduced buffers and setbacks normally required by the zoning ordinance.

That vote took place Nov. 14 with some of the appeals board members opposing the variance for the project because it was too large for the small space upon which it was to be built.

The site plan had been revised since its first hearing before the board of appeals in August, with square footage reductions to the restaurant and carry out to 1,400 square feet and 1,225 square feet respectively with the coffee shop increasing to 1,200 square feet from 952 square feet.

The conditions of the variance were that the developer must put up a 10-foot buffer of plantings along the immediate section of Clarks Landing Road as well as Mervell Dean Road and a 6-foot buffer of plantings along its rear towards Route 235.


The variances the developer requested were to reduce the setback from roadway from 50 feet to 35 feet along Route 235 and from 35 feet to 25 feet along Mervell Dean Road.

The three-shop commercial project would stand behind the Bruster's Real Ice Cream and in close proximity to businesses across Mervell Dean Road.

Morgan was concerned that the project was too intensive for the small parcel.

"It looks like they're trying to squeeze as much as possible on a very small parcel," Morgan said.

St. Mary's Splash to Raise Funds for Special Olympics

This Saturday swimmers will wade into chilly waters at Point Lookout State Park in Scotland to help raise money for Special Olympics in St. Mary's County and ensure they have funding for sports and leadership programs throughout the year.

There are 8,033 Special Olympics athletes in Maryland, according to St. Mary's Splash event organizer information.

Fundraising leading up the event has brought in \$13,600, just short of the \$15,000 goal, the event website states.

Jeff Hagen, area director for Special Olympics, said all money raised this Saturday will support local special Olympians.

"This is for St. Mary's only," Hagen

The Polar Bear Plunge is a statewide event held on the shore of the Chesapeake Bay.

Hagen said about 200 people have registered before the event to raise funds, swimmers who arrive the day of the event can pay \$75 to wade into the chill waters.

"That \$75 gives them the t-shirt saying, 'I Splashed," Hagen said. "It gives them bragging rights."

About twice as many people have signed up to participate this year as opposed to last year, Hagen said.

Registration starts at 11a.m. and the splash occurs at 1p.m.

School Board Approves \$1.5 Million for Health Premium Holiday

The St. Mary's County Board of Education approved a budget amendment Tuesday morning at a special meeting at their Moakley Street headquarters in Leonardtown to use \$1.5 million from a prescription medication plan rebate to provide a limited health premium holiday for system employees.

Last month, the school board had sought approval from the county commissioners to provide a premium holiday for four paychecks, but it was rejected; the latest plan would allow system employees to avoid paying health premiums for two paycheck periods.

The system would use the \$1.5 million to pay the premiums for employees, as well as to retirees for their healthcare holiday, and the remainder to other postemployment benefits (OPEB).

Of the \$1.5 million, \$412,848 would go to the premium holiday, \$329,610 will go to retiree healthcare while \$757,542 will go to OPEB.

School Superintendent J. Scott Smith said for the past several years the system had been able to provide several health premium holidays; this year the school system got a rebate of \$3.5 million.

Last year the system got \$2.9 million back and was able to provide four premium holidays.

School system information showed

that employees took fewer visits to the emergency room, instead using urgent care facilities, as well as telemed conferences with physicians to help lower costs.

"Our employees are doing an incredible thing," Smith said. "They're earning us money back."

But, Smith said, the money the system got back due to its employees being frugal with their health plans was fund balance and could be controlled by the Commissioners of St. Mary's County.

"They are completely correct... this is not in our original budget," Smith said at Tuesday's meeting. "They have complete control... they can veto the amount."

Smith said the current plan would help to bolster their underfunded OPEB account, which has a liability of more than \$300 million.

School Board Member Rita Weaver, who was the lone opposition vote to the adjusted plan, said rumors on social media stating that even employees who had not contributed to the health plan would receive a benefit were false.

"That's wrong," Weaver said. "If you did not put into the system, you will not receive a health care holiday."

Weaver still supported giving premium holiday over four pay periods.

Commissioners Sign Memorandum of Cooperation with Pärnu to Form Sister Counties

On Tuesday, Dec. 3, 2019, during their regular business meeting, the Commissioners of St. Mary's County signed a Memorandum of Cooperation with the Chairman of the Maryland Estonia Exchange Council, Tovi Tagamets, to enter into a partnership of sister counties between St. Mary's County and the Association of Local Authority Pärnu County, Estonia.

According to the memorandum, this agreement will allow for the "exploration of opportunities to cultivate a greater understanding of each other, raise cross-cultural awareness between both cities and generally advance their friendship. Furthermore, we will work together toward sharing information and creative endeavors between St. Mary's County and The Association of Local Authorities of Pärnumaa." Commissioner President Randy Guy remarked,

"This is a unique opportunity for St. Mary's County, and we are proud to enter into this agreement."

This partnership is one of many similar arrangements between other counties in Maryland and Estonia. It is the culmination of several months of work between representatives from St. Mary's County and the Maryland Exchange Council. Pärnu County is one of 15 counties of Estonia and is in the southwestern part of the country.

Maryland Announces National Hotline on MS-13 Gang

Maryland is the first District to announce the new nationwide FBI tipline, 1-866-STP-MS13 (1-866-787-6713), to gather information about the criminal activities of the MS-13 gang. To help publicize the tipline and encourage people who may have information about the gang to call, a Spanish-language public service announcement was also debuted today.

The tipline was announced by United States Attorney for the District of Maryland Robert K. Hur; Special Agent in Charge Jennifer C. Boone of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Baltimore Field Office; Special Agent in Charge Rob Cekada of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) Baltimore Field Division; Special Agent in Charge John Eisert of Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Baltimore Office; Chief Edward G. Hargis of the Frederick Police Department; Chief Edward Jackson of the Annapolis Police Department; Chief Timothy J. Altomare of the Anne Arundel County Police Department; Chief Henry P. Stawinski III of the Prince George's County Police Department; Chief Marcus Jones of the Montgomery County Police Department; and Chief Amal Awad of the City of Hyattsville Police Department.

"This new tipline adds to our tool box in the fight against MS-13," said U.S. Attorney Robert K. Hur. "MS-13 is terrorizing and preying upon entire communities. We want to help end the fear and violence, but we need the community's help to fight back. Please, if you have information, call 1-866-STP-MS13 (1-866-787-6713). Federal, state, and local law enforcement are working together to find and bring to justice MS-13 members who commit heinous crimes—and your information will help us to do that. Your identity will be protected."

"MS-13 uses violence to strike fear in our communities and they count on that fear resulting in silence," said FBI Baltimore Special Agent in Charge Jennifer Boone. "We must not allow fear and silence to be weapons MS-13 is allowed to use. Please call the FBI at 1-866-STP-MS13 (1-866-787-6713). Use your voice to tell them, no more."

The FBI tipline allows individuals to provide information about MS-13 activities to a central location and the FBI will then disseminate the information to the appropriate law enforcement authorities for investigation. The Spanish-language public service announcement (PSA) features a mother who was extorted by MS-13 and whose child was murdered by the gang. In the PSA the victim encourages others to call the FBI so the FBI can help them. The PSA is available for download at: https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=DEBUTDOgCaQ and has captions enabled for both English and Spanish. In addition, the video will be live in the videos section on the FBI's website, www.fbi.gov.

MS-13 is a national and international gang composed primarily of immigrants or descendants from El Salvador. Branches or "cliques" of MS-13, one of the largest street gangs in the United States, operate throughout Frederick County, Anne Arundel County, Prince George's County, and Montgomery County, Maryland. MS-13 members are required to commit acts of violence both to maintain membership and discipline within the gang, as well as against rival gang members. To protect the gang and to enhance its reputation, MS-13 members and associates are expected to use any means necessary to force respect from those who show disrespect, including acts of intimidation and violence. MS-13 has mottos consistent with its rules, beliefs, expectations and reputation including "mata, viola, controla," which translates as, "kill, rape, control," and "ver, oir y callar," which means, "see nothing, hear nothing and say nothing."

Charges Filed After Suspect Flees Traffic Stop in St. Mary's County

After consultation with the Office of the State's Attorney for St. Mary's County, charges have been filed against the suspect who fled a traffic stop in St. Mary's County.

The accused is identified as Dion Jamar Davis, 29, of Lexington Park, Maryland. Davis is charged with second degree assault, resisting arrest, possession of controlled dangerous substance and other traffic violations..

Shortly before 8:30 p.m. Nov. 29, state troopers from the Leonardtown Barrack were working stationary patrol on Maryland Route 246 (Great Mills Road) when they observed a Cadillac CTS traveling without its headlights illuminated. One of the troopers subsequently followed the vehicle and initiated a traffic stop at Forest Run Drive at Great Mills

As the trooper approached the Cadillac on foot, he detected the odor

of marijuana. A second trooper arrived on scene for assistance. The driver and sole occupant of the Cadillac, later identified as Davis, was asked to step out of the vehicle at which time he accelerated and fled from the traffic stop.

A low speed vehicle pursuit ensued and within two minutes, the Cadillac began to emit smoke. Davis stopped the Cadillac at a dead end on Spring Valley Drive at Valley Court at which time the engine compartment caught fire. Davis exited the burning vehicle and fled on foot behind an apartment complex on Valley Court.

The state trooper who was first to arrive on the scene pursued Davis on foot while maintaining visual contact with him. He noticed that Davis was fidgeting at his waistband for something. In fear for his life and others on the scene, the trooper removed his agency issued firearm from his holster

and continued to pursue Davis on foot. At some point during the foot pursuit, the trooper and Davis became involved in a physical altercation. During the struggle, one round was discharged from the firearm. At this time, circumstances surrounding the discharge of the round are currently under investigation. No one was injured.

Davis surrendered and was immediately taken into police custody. No one was injured during the incident.

State Police investigators are continuing to conducted interviews with witnesses. State Police crime scene technicians responded to process the scene.

The investigation is ongoing and being conducted by the Maryland State Police Criminal Enforcement Division. An investigation is also underway by the Maryland State Police Internal Affairs Unit, which is procedure.

Hollywood, Bay District Respond to Five Car Crash

Morganza Man Killed in Mechanicsville Crash

The Maryland State Police Crash Team continues to investigate a fatal crash on Saturday, November 30th, that claimed the life of a St. Mary's County man.

The deceased is identified as Joseph Smith, 50, of Morganza, Maryland. Smith was the driver of a 2017 Nissan Rogue at the time. He was pronounced deceased at the scene by emergency medical service personnel.

The other vehicle involved was a 2010 Chevrolet Express, operated by Kyle Nelson, 32, of Mechanics-ville, Maryland. Nelson was flown by Trooper 7 to Prince George's Hospital. Charges are pending the outcome of the investigation.

The preliminary investigation indi-

cates Nelson, who was operating the Chevrolet Express, crossed the center line into oncoming traffic. Police believe that shortly before 11:00 p.m, he was heading north in the south bound lanes when he struck the Nissan Rogue headon in the area of Dr. Johnson Road and Kelly Cottage Lane in Mechanicsville.

The Maryland State Police Crash team is actively investigating the incident and consulting with the Office of the State's Attorney in St. Mary's County. Investigators believe alcohol may be a factor in the crash.

Anyone with relevant information or who may have witnessed the incident is urged to contact the Leonardtown Barrack at 301-475-8955. The investigation continues.





FDR Boulevard Completion Still Years Away

FDR Boulevard, one of the county's most important road projects designed to reduce congestion on Route 235 by providing a parallel route that will allow motorists to access key commercial properties and neighborhoods, is likely to be completed sometime in the fall of 2022, county Department of Public Works and Transportation officials said this week.

But the project has been stalled multiple times over the past two years, causing the construction schedule to be pushed back again and again.

On the county's construction project books for decades, the project was restored to funding levels in 2007 and has been slowly reaching completion in certain areas; one piece of it from First Colony Boulevard to Old Rolling Road, known as Phase 1B, was opened to much fanfare last summer but it was just six-tenths of a mile in length.

The great object of the project is to build a fully connected road to the west of Route 235 running from St. Andrews Church Road south to Pegg Road, which is immediately opposite from the main gate of Patuxent River Naval Air Station.

Phase 1 of the project, located between St. Andrews Church Road and Chancellors Run Road, is divided into

three sections and has been the focal point of several delays.

Phase 1C is the last of the three sections that is waiting to be completed and sits between Phase 1B to the north and Phase 1A to the south.

Phase 1A runs from the Hickory Hills North community to Chancellors Run Road.

Allen Settle, the county's road engineer who is in charge of the overall project, said the completion of Phase 1C would be a major accomplishment, since it would open a connector road between two major state routes, Route 4 (St. Andrews Church Road) and Route 237 (Chancellors Run Road).

But this crucial section won't be finished until at least the end of spring of next year, Settle told The County Times.

The delays surrounding Phase 1C have been many, not the least of which was finding a wetland mitigation site to accommodate construction there.

Since a wetland had to be impacted by construction on FDR Boulevard, the county had to find a site for another to be constructed, this one in Leonardtown at the general site of the new library/senior center, Settle said.

"Overall [the selection of the wetland mitigation site] took four years," Settle said. "We looked through 100 properties throughout the county."

Public works chief John Deatrick said the rules they had to follow were necessary, but produced frustration.

"It's perfectly understandable, seeing why people are so frustrated," Deatrick said. "What's most frustrating is getting this triple culvert site finished behind Wal-Mart.

"It's very difficult to work there."

There are no plans to have a direct connection from FDR Boulevard to Wal-Mart, Settle and Deatrick said

The main reason is that such a road would run too close to a storm water management pond directly behind the store, Settle said.

Installation of the triple culvert, upon which would rest part of the FDR Boulevard roadway, is now the key delay in finishing Phase 1C.

The soft soil there made it necessary to excavate tons of earth from there to be replaced by soil that could be compacted to an acceptable firmness to withstand heavy traffic and maintain the road's structural integrity, Settle said.

"The triple culverts are in," Settle said. "The roadway embankment is still under construction over the triple culvert."

Despite all of the challenges that public works and the contractor face in completing the project, continued wet weather both last month and this have caused delays, Settle said the completion will be a major accomplishment.

"In terms of traffic, it'll be huge," Settle said.

Aside from mitigating wetlands and dealing with poor soils in the northern most part of the project, engineers have also had to move multiple utilities including those of SME-CO, Verizon, Washington Gas and Atlantic Broadband, Settle

All of this was required to build on a section of road found between Barefoot Drive and Kinnegad Drive to complete the first phase of the project.

Work there will continue through December but will essentially be on hold from January and February since cold temperatures prohibit the laying of concrete and asphalt, Settle said

This means construction will have to begin in earnest in March through May of next year, Settle said, to make the current goal.

What is known as Phase 3 will run from Chancellors Run Road south to Pegg Road, has had no county construction work done yet, but is fully planned, according to the public works chief.

"All of our engineering plans are 100 percent done," Deatrick said.

The first phase, Phase 3A, will run from Chancellors Run Road to Buck Hewitt Road and have two traffic circles at its intersections with MacArthur Boulevard and Buck Hewitt Road.

The section from Buck Hewitt Road that runs to Pegg Road will also feature a new traffic light that will be synced with the traffic light at Pegg Road and Route 235, according to the county's construction plans.

"Right now, we're doing property acquisitions from Route 237 to Buck Hewitt Road," Settle said, noting that a piece of FDR Boulevard has been built by the developer of the Victory Woods subdivision with an intersection at Buck Hewitt Road

Before 2012 there was a Phase 4 of FDR Boulevard, to run from Pegg Road further south to Great Mills Road, but that was removed from the capital construction plan to put the focus on getting commuter traffic to and from the Navy base, Settle said.

That section may be revived as a construction project, he said, but only by order of the county commissioners and then likely after connection of Phase 1 and Phase 3

Phase 2 of FDR Boulevard, the shortest at just two-tenths of a mile, runs from Great Mills Road to South Shangri La Drive, between the Bay District Volunteer Fire Department and the Lexington Park Volunteer Rescue Squad headquarters.

It was completed several years ago by the county.





of the major reasons anyone goes into any form of engineering is to be able to apply math and physical sciences to building and creating. "The University System of Maryland at Southern Maryland Partnership is an awesome opportunity," Linkins said.

Students in the partnership program can take the majority of their classes in Southern Maryland at CSM and then, once they have earned their associate degree, take classes at the University System of Maryland at Southern Maryland (USMSM), formerly known as the Southern Maryland Higher Education Center, to complete their junior and senior classes with UMD. Students enrolled in this program will typically have three classes per semester at USMSM and one class at UMD's College Park Campus. An additional class may be taken online or through an electronically based distance education service. In support of this partnership program, NAWCAD and UMD have established a state-of-the-art engineering laboratory at USMSM that is dedicated to support junior- and senior-level engineering courses.

CSM students following this program have also had the opportunity to do internships with NAWCAD, with a possible employment opportunity upon successful graduation and completion of all Guided Pathway program requirements.

The winter war has begun. No, it is not another war going on somewhere in the world. This war goes on in our home every year. And from the conversations I have had with my women friends, I am definitely not the only one. For some households it is the war of the thermostat. Mainly the women want it cooler and men want the house warmer – though this is not always the case. We do not have a thermostat. My wood-cutting husband likes to keep his woodstove loaded and stoked with a heat index close to an Arizona desert at noon on the hottest day of the year. It is a constant temperature of boiling in here. If my husband has been out



and asks if I added a few logs to the fire, my response to his question is a smoldering look from my burning eyes.

A few weeks ago he had a custom woodstove made by the Amish, one that won't leak smoke and will heat more efficiently. I was not quite ready for how large this woodstove is compared to the last one – neither was he. This stove had to be placed sideways on the concrete hearth with the glass facing away from the seating area, much to Mindy the crazy hound dog's chagrin. She loves to stare at the fire. In fact, she loves to stare at the fire so much that she ate a space out of the previous couch's arm just big enough for Mindy to rest her head on and watch the flames.

This new woodstove is so hot that a few nights I have taken to turning on the air-conditioning in the bedroom, since there is nowhere else in the house I can get cool. Occasionally, I come here in the office, close the door, and open the window. When you come out of the bedroom you get hit with a solid wall of heat.

Other than my husband, Mindy is the only other living soul who enjoys the heat as much as he does. She lays down on her couch downstairs near the woodstove and sleeps a good part of any day. As if 3 or 4 feet away wasn't close enough, Mindy will sometimes get off the couch and lay down a foot away from the raging behemoth.

When my mother-in-law lived with us downstairs, she would have to close the door to her bedroom. More than once she brought up her decorative candles to show us that they had melted into unrecognizable pools of wax. After my frame shop closed and I moved operations to a corner of the basement and into my workshop, the original idea was to wait on customers on my flat file worktable in the basement. I tried. But a framer who is constantly mopping her brow and gasping for cool air is not a good situation. Customers come into the outside workshop now, where I can control the heat and AC. I must add that I still get overheated, but not quite as bad as inside. 40° to 60° seems to be my optimal functioning temperature.

Needless to say, any car we are in is another battle ground for temperature control. "I'm dying, it's too hot!" as I roll the window down. "It's not hot, your crazy, it's 20 degrees outside!" What couple doesn't go through this or the infamous seat adjustment conflict. "Why can't you put the seat back when you get out?!!! "Because it's MY car, do you reset your seat forward for me in your car?!!!!!" This invariably leads to "I don't like you!" I don't like you either!" and then a minute or two later and a little softer to "I don't like you, but I love you." "Yeah, I don't like you right now, but I love you all the time." I know, awwww............

Marines Complete RQ-21A UAS Maintenance Course to Prep for New Schoolhouse

The Marine Corps and RQ-21A Blackjack training systems recently completed the first unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) maintenance technician course in preparation for the new schoolhouse scheduled to open next year in Cherry Point, North Carolina.

The Navy and Marine Corps Small Tactical UAS program office (PMA-263) is now finalizing the eight-week pilot course curriculum with the Center for Naval Aviation Technical Training Unit (CNATTU), Naval Air Warfare Center Training Systems Division, and the students who recently completed the course.

"This is a great progression of the RQ-21A program as we prepare to hand the maintenance training baton over to CNATT, who has worked closely with us, the fleet, and our industry partner Insitu to develop a first-class curriculum for our future Marine maintenance technicians," said Col. John Neville, PMA-263 program manager.

Students in the pilot course were hand-selected to ensure a wide variety of experience levels. The RQ-21A-qualified instructors from CNATTU taught lessons in the classroom and then students got hands-on practice in the labs.

"I enjoyed being a part of the pilot course because I was able to provide my opinion and input," said Lance Cpl. Isaac Allen, CNATT student. "I appreciated being able to have an effect on the pace of each lesson and what I thought should be changed, so those in future classes can learn best."

The curriculum includes introduction to UAS operations; RQ-21A system overview; RQ-21A system theory of operation; flight line, flight, launcher and recovery operations; pre-flight and post flight inspections; RQ-21A scheduled and unscheduled maintenance; and RQ-21A troubleshooting procedures.

"It was neat to return back to the schoolhouse and learn about the RQ-21A system in a more in-depth course compared to the rest of my peers in Hawaii," said Lance Cpl. Latasha Lonzo, assigned to Marine Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Squadron (VMU) 3. "Although I was able to use my prior knowledge

from when I worked on the RQ-7B Shadow, I still found the curriculum to be challenging and very engaging, especially the labs."

The official Marine Corps qualification course for future Marine UAS Maintenance Technicians will be designated as MOS 6314.



The Tackle Box Fishing Report

Rockfish are gathered in the mouth of the Potomac and out into the bay in the "Triangle " area. The fish are feeding on alewife large enough to bring gannets in to feast on the bait balls. The big sea birds like the alewives, or menhaden that achieve the 6 to 12 inch size.

The rockfish we are catching are in the 22 to 30 inch range. The big stripers in the 40 to 50 inch Atlantic Ocean fall run have yet to show up, but they prefer the big bait that is here now and may arrive soon. There have been reports on one or two big rockfish caught around the bay bridge tunnel, but they are unconfirmed.

The fish have been very dependable biting everyday with vast flocks of birds showing the location of the feeding fish.

If you get out and can't find active birds, look for birds sitting on the water and motor around looking for fish on the depth finder. You may find them and not get the expected strikes, but they will turn on sooner or later.

Fresh water fishing is very good in the ponds and at St. Mary's Lake. Crappie are hitting live minnows and the bass are loving lures.


