Is School Redistricting Coming to Calvert?

School Board Member Says Maybe

Calvert County Board of Education member Dawn Balinski said, "This board, I think, needs to consider.... bringing up the dreaded 'R' word." Balinski was referring to "redistricting," which the board hasn't been forced to do in quite some time.

Balinski observed, "The most disruptive and emotional undertaking is to redistrict, to tell people that they can't go to their beloved schools. They're going to be going to another school they're not sure of. But you know, it just might have to happen."

Balinski made her comments at the May 12 school board meeting during a presentation of the proposed Educational Facilities Master Plan for 2024 by Director of School Construction Shuchita Warner. That plan is due to be submitted to the state by July 1.

The county's Adequate Public Facilities Ordinance (APFO) does temporarily halt any new development in an area for six years if a school serving that area is over capacity to give the county time to add classroom space.

In recent years, several northern county schools were over capacity, thus halting new development there. But with COVID, enrollment pulled back and the APFO halt was lifted. Warner said, however, that the restrictions will be returning as kids return to the classrooms.

Warner said, "This year's spring adequate public facilities report does once again indicate that Northern High School and Mount Harmony Elementary School are over capacity and therefore closed for final recording of residential subdivisions and residential site development plans."

Balinski said, "As it stands right now, we are over capacity in our northern schools or getting close to it in the center. And in the southern, we are under capacity. Some of the centrals are pretty much at capacity, but not everyone.'

I looked at the projections," she said, "and it doesn't seem like that's going to correct itself in the next 10 years."



tary School now under construction, the master plan includes Northern Middle School and Mt. Harmony Elementary.

Warner said the 2022 population estimate for the county is 94,240, or 870 new residents

since last year. School population is up 110 from last year but still has not gone back to pre-pandemic levels.

Warner said in 2032 school enrollment is projected to be around 15,700, with the biggest gains in elementary levels, offset by losses at the middle and high school levels.

Warner noted, "The total number of permits are still not back to 2017 and prior levels. However, we do continue to see an upward trend in concept plans and building

Warner said that the number of children in the now completed Beechtree Apartments and at Calvert Hills in Prince Frederick are running higher than anticipated.

She said, "Our records show that we have 98 students coming from Beechtree and 24 students from Calvert Hills, all districted to Barstow Elementary, Calvert Middle and Calvert High.

Balinski said about the possibility of redistricting, "It's not good for schools to be over capacity. It's not good for schools to be under capacity either.

Warner said Windy Hill Middle School is the one that appears to be in danger of overcrowding due to possible development. The Northern Middle School project could alleviate sone of that overcrowding but would require a shift in the two school boundaries.

The plan will be available for public review and comment before the board final-

Education Support Staff Seek More Respect

While the Calvert County Board of Education often hears from representatives of the teacher's union, the Calvert Education Association, it is not so often they hear from the organization that represents the non-teaching staff.

But at the May 12 school board meeting, Stacy Tayman, president of that group, Calvert Association of Education Support Staff, did speak, asking for more respect for her members.

Tayman said she wasn't intending to be critical, "more enlightening."

Tayman noted, "At a recent meeting that focused on the CCPS (Calvert County Public Schools) budget, an offhanded comment was made that if the budget was not fully funded and positions needed to be cut, then cuts should, start with non-teaching positions."

She said, "I'm not speaking to the actual thought of cutting positions, just the quick reaction of where cuts should start if needed. So, let's talk a little bit about nonteaching positions. What do they look like? Our transportation department is non-teaching; so is

payroll and human resources and they are already understaffed. It is non-teaching."

She added, "And what would virtual learning have looked like if CCPS did not have the computer distribution or the help desk that was put in place during the pandemic.

"Maybe the thought was more directed at food service. Trust me, with what they are paid, I don't think we'll see a lot of savings there."

Tayman went on to say, "There is an imbalance in the way our support staff are viewed in relation to other classifications. The

positions that I speak of today are not all inclusive of what we do. We are highly diverse in the services we provide to the school system and our community, and should be considered equally, not as part of a perceived hierarchy of value."

Tayman said she recently talked to a local businessman who was doing a "Celebrate Teachers" program. She asked for the program to be extended to all school staff.

She said, "Maybe I'm biased, but I have a lot of faith in our non-teaching HVAC technicians who make sure the air we breathe is clean and the exchange ratios are appropriate. I think our non-teaching secretaries who screen visitors and safeguard student data deserve recognition."

She said of the response, "I was told that they would have to see how things went with the teachers first. And if there was anything left over, they might extend it. My point is not to condemn this business, but to illustrate a point about the disrespect and lack of understanding, not only inside our walls, but in our community about our work."

Jefferson Patterson Park and Museum to Get \$8 Million Dollar Transformation

The Maryland Board of Public Works (BPW) has approved an \$8.58 million contract to upgrade and transform several 1930s era buildings at the historical Jefferson Patterson Park and Museum (JPPM) in Calvert County. BPW is composed of Governor Larry Hogan, Treasurer Dereck E. Davis, and Comptroller Peter Franchot.

"Our museums and parks play an important role in providing educational opportunities and recreation for our citizens," said Maryland Department of Planning Secretary Rob McCord. "JPPM connects Marylanders to the past through history and archaeology, and these upgrades will allow us to continue to honor this tremendous legacy."

Several JPPM buildings, including the Patterson House (the main museum house), and additional outbuildings will have the electrical, heating and cooling, plumbing, security, and automatic fire protection renovated and upgraded. The project will transform the Patterson House and two primary outbuildings into a modern, public museum and events facility. The



contract was awarded to North Point Builders of Maryland, LLC and is expected to be completed late 2024.

JPPM, which was gifted to the state in 1983 by Mary Marvin Breckinridge Patterson, is located on 560 scenic acres along the Patuxent River in Calvert County and includes miles of trails, a Visitor Center full of interactive exhibits, and dozens of educational programs and events. JPPM is also the home of the Maryland Archaeological Conservation (MAC) Laboratory, which is one of only three in the nation, and currently stores more than 10 mil-

lion artifacts. The park is open all year from 7:30 a.m. to dusk except on New Year's Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas week.

End of an Era: FIT to Inflation, Interest Rates Close Local Office

For Florida Institute of Technology ("FIT" or Florida Tech) Southern Maryland, 2022 marks a major milestone as the 50th year serving the local community with quality graduate programs in engineering, management, and business. More than 1,500 degrees have been conferred to local students over the past five decades, and this does not include the many students who have earned their degrees at the main campus in Melbourne Florida or online

This accomplishment is bittersweet because the local office is closing later this month. As of May 31, 2022 Florida Tech will cease offering local classroom instruction. Students may apply to online programs, but the local presence will end. This is the case for all Florida Tech offsite locations outside of central Florida including those in Maryland, Virginia, and Alabama.

Florida Tech is very grateful to the many local organizations that have been part of these students' success. First and foremost, NAS Patuxent River and NAWCAD/ NAVAIR (originally NATC) for the invitation in 1972 to offer the M.S. in Electrical Engineering. This program list eventually grew to more than twenty to accommodate changes in need. The most recent new program, the M.S. and Graduate Certificate in Flight Test Engineering, was co-developed with NAWCAD/USNTPS. and is the only one of its kind in the country. More than half of the local students are enrolled in Flight Test Engineering programs.

Florida Tech thanks the Navy for providing office and classroom space for so long. None of this would be possible without this essential support. For about 10 years, space was leased offbase in Lexington Park through Millison Management Co. In 2014, Florida Tech became a university partner at then-SMHEC (Southern Maryland Higher Education Center) and now-USMSM (University of Maryland at Southern Maryland). SMHEC/USMSM was founded 25 years ago to fulfill a similar mission as Florida



Tech's: highly-skilled workforce development.

Appreciation is extended to St. Mary's County Chamber of Commerce, The Patuxent Partnership, Southern Maryland Navy Alliance, Lexington Park Rotary, and other community organizations where Florida Tech was a member. Also, to College of Southern Maryland, St. Mary's College of Maryland, and Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University where articulation agreements were developed, or where many students matriculated. Also, Defense Acquisition University (DAU) for the long-standing articulation agreement for transfer credits of many students from the base. To St. Mary's County Public Schools and the local private and parochial schools where programs were supported including faculty participating in science fairs and other STEM-related events. Also, to local employers – from the Navy to numerous defense contractors to MedStar, SMECO, and the many small businesses - by providing tuition assistance and entrusting in Florida Tech to advance their employees, both professionally and personally.

Look to Drive Local Housing Market

As inflation soars and interest rates continue to rise from historic lows, the spring housing market in Southern Maryland is starting to show some anticipated trends.

Although an overwhelming majority of homes that sold over the last month did so in under 10 days, there is more active inventory than there was last year at the same time. Even though most homes sold quickly, the average days on the market in Southern Maryland rose slightly from 2021 by two days.

This is a slight positive as the region saw its months of inventory grow to .71 months in April, and hopefully on its way back to healthy market levels which haven't been seen since 2019.

With climbing interest rates now passing 5 percent, home sales and home price appreciation are expected to slow down. Due to the time of year and current economic volatility, it will be increasingly difficult to tell how effective these rate changes are until months down the road.

"It is always a good time to purchase real estate, despite recent upticks in mortgage lending rates and little inventory," Southern Maryland Association of Realtors® 2021-22 President Gregg Kantak said. "Nonetheless, understanding how housing affects inflation means understanding what US inflation data tries to measure. The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a "cost-of-living index": its purpose is to measure the price of different goods and services that households consume. It is not meant to measure the value of investment assets that families hold, such as stocks. However, this goal creates a unique challenge with owner-occupied housing: the price of a house reflects both its value as an investment asset, which CPI in principle wants to ignore, and as a good that provides a "service" (i.e., shelter) to the families that live in it, whose cost CPI wants to incorporate."

Prices are still growing, as the region saw the median sold price rise by 8.11% when compared to last year, up to \$400,000.

Market volatility and uncertainty is considered a major contributor to the reduction of people wanting to sell their homes, leading to a decrease in new listings in April of last year by 7.09 per-



cent. The total number of new listings is not far off from the 5-year average.

Another sign of the market returning to more normal levels is seeing a slight drop in the average sold price to the original list price

During the same time last year, homes were selling on average for 101.8 percent of what they were originally listed for, but that number has now dropped to 101.3 percent. Although it is a small decrease, it shows a significant change in the local market.

"Rising home prices have direct effects on household wealth and neighborhood affordability," Kantak explained. "They also play an important role in overall inflation. Even small increases in rent and home prices can, in principle, have noticeable effects on overall inflation."

All Aboard for the Chesapeake Beach Railway Museum Renovated Museum Now Open for Visitors

"We're excited to welcome folks back after a nearly two-year hiatus due to COVID and the renovations." said Chesapeake Beach Railway Museum Curator Jeffrey Murray, who is also Director of Calvert Marine Museum in Solomons.

The county-owned Calvert Marine Museum took over operation of the railway museum at the opposite end of the county in 2019, just before the pandemic shut everything down. But the museum had planned to be closed for a while anyway for a major renovation. That is now finished and the completely refreshed Chesapeake Beach Railway Museum is open for those wanting another staycation destination.

"I would really welcome folks to come in and see us. I think they will be wowed by a brand-new exhibit in what feels like a much more open space. I think it's aesthetically pleasing and it's educational and it just is a firstclass exhibit.'

Reflecting back to 2019, Murray said, "The railway museum is closed during the winter months anyway, so we had wrapped up that season and then of course COVID hit the following March," adding, "It actually was remarkably coincidental because we had plans to close it for the balance of the 2020 season in order to do this new exhibit that is the primary exhibit for the entire museum.

The museum's website explains the history behind it: "In the late 1800s, a group of Colorado railroad men shared a dream to build a world-class seaside destination on the shores of the Chesapeake and a railroad to connect it to Washington, D.C. The official opening ceremony for the railway took place on June 9, 1900, and the last train departed on April 15, 1935. The amusements continued until the 1970s, evolving with the times. During its heyday, the Chesapeake Beach Resort attracted tens of thousands of people. However, changing tastes, wars, damaging storms, the great depression—experiences that are familiar to us today - all conspired to bring this enterprise to a close. The town created by this grand endeavor lives on, and the traces of its beginnings are evident everywhere. The Chesapeake Beach Railway Museum (CBRM) tells the story of these men, the dream they built, and the town that continues to redefine the story. Thanks to the Donovan Family, the original 1898 train depot survives and serves as the home of the CBRM.



The museum opened in 1979 with the help of local volunteers and the Calvert County Historical Society."

They're open every day from 1-4:30

Those who have been there before will return to "a completely different exhibit experience," Murray said.
"We've split it up into a few different

themes. It's primarily located in the waiting room of the railway station. As you walk in the front door, you're immediately greeted with some cutouts of travelers in the 1920's and 30's, as well as four differently themed corners to the room. It starts with the dream of the founders of the Chesapeake Beach Railway, as well as of course the town of Chesapeake Beach, because those two things are intertwined." Murray said, "The (original) inves-

tors wanted to turn Chesapeake Beach into the Monte Carlo of the east or the Atlantic City of the south. It was going to be a place for high rolling gambling and not necessarily a place for Calvert County residents, but for the high rollers from the DC area who would be willing to get on the train and come down and they could also spend their money gambling and and enjoy themselves by the beach."

The story then moves to "the journey, which is the story of the railway itself," Murray said. "We have a giant locomotive on the wall complete with its own headlight, a number of different games and things from the 1920s and 30, s. There's a slot machine in there from the original gambling

The fourth quadrant is about the destination, Chesapeake Beach. In addition to that slot machine, Murray said, "There's a kangaroo that came off of the carousel that sat in the amusement park. There was an amusement park in Chesapeake Beach from 1900 until 1972, in three various stages.'

He explained, "In addition to the

railway, you had steamboats that would come down from the Baltimore and Annapolis areas. It was just a big, huge resort, lakeside amusement area and gambling area for lots of folks."

There is also a changing exhibit area that is focused right now on "bathing suits of the early 20th Century."

Out back at the museum is an original railcar called "The Dolores," that is used for educational programs. For a listing of their educational programs, go to www.Chesapeake Beach Railway Museum – All Aboard!
The refurbished museum also has

the station master's office renovated into an exhibit "that includes items such as the telegraph and the station master's desk and the stamps and all of the ephemera that a station master would've had. There's a giant safe in that room, which has probably never moved because it's so big," Murray

New interactive exhibits keyed to cellphone QR readers allow you to hear voices, from various folks who were traversing on the railway or spending time at Chesapeake Beach. Murray said, "We have some letters that were written home from folks who were in the service who visited Chesapeake Beach on holiday, and all sorts of voices from the past.

Even though the railway wasn't geared for county residents, the museum, Murray said, "It tells the story of the town of Chesapeake Beach and why it's there. It's a unique Calvert County story as to why the landscape includes the resort town of Chesapeake Beach and its twin sister North Beach, because without the founding of that railway and the investors who were interested in putting their money on Chesapeake Beach, you wouldn't have the town you have today."

As to the museums on opposite ends of the county, Murray noted, "The railway museum has its own mission that tells its own stories and



the marine museum really tells the stories of the Chesapeake Bay, right from three different angles. So, you've got the natural history, the man-made history, as well as the biology of the Bay. Now the Chesapeake Beach Railway Museum also tells stories about the Bay in terms of it's on the Bay. And the reason it's there is because the water was there, but at that point, the missions of the two institutions essentially diverge."

The railway museum is looking for volunteers. Murray said, "During COVID, and during the renovation, we were closed for the better part of 2020 and 2021. We did reopen last fall in September and have gotten really great reviews and a big uptick in attendance. We have a few paid staff that work at the museum, but we do always need volunteers. Our volunteer core with this new exhibit has been reinvigorated. And I would say that we have probably three or four times the interest in volunteer participation right now than we did prior to the renovation. There's a great, wonderful

Murray moted the importance to the museum of their Friends group, headed by Mike Sweeney, president of the board.

As to its potential economic impact to the county, Murray said, "Within Chesapeake Beach, people are always looking for things to do. Sometimes they're down there already to visit the Rod 'N Reel or do something else in the Chesapeake Beach area. I think it can be. We've had several bus tours. Those things are starting to ramp up."

"I think, in terms of what it can do for the county, for its size, it can do quite a bit."





Working solo or in small groups, students create original documentary films, exhibits, performances, research papers, or websites exploring a historical topic of their choice on an annual theme, which this year is "Debate & Diplomacy in History: Successes, Failures, Consequences." Maryland History Day is open to public, private, parochial, and homeschool students in grades 6 through 12.

Competitors at Maryland History Day have already won first or second place in their category at school and/or district levels. Students from thirteen counties and Baltimore City received special awards, designated for outstanding Maryland History Day projects that cover specific subjects.

Leave the Classroom and Hit the Road This Spring



The richness of Southern Maryland is on display this spring as the College of Southern Maryland (CSM) unveils a number of experience-based Personal Enrichment classes that will allow students to encounter the history and culture of our region and beyond.

"People that are looking for new things to do that they may not be able to do on their own," said CSM Director of Personal Enrichment Shaunda Holt. "We are making it easy for them to experience amazing things,"

The experiences stretch the limits of what most people imagine when they register for a class: Students won't be passively listening to lectures and completing assignments. Instead, they will be immersed in the subject they are studying, doing everything from spreading sauce on an authentic Italian pizza to climbing to the top of a lighthouse to gaze across the water.

The experiences will also far exceed what community members would be capable of planning on their own. In several cases, such as the "At Home With History" class, students will be granted access to areas that are normally closed to the public. And with a qualified instructor guiding participants, the experience will be much richer.

"Everything comes alive when you have someone that is passionate about what they do guiding your experience," said Holt. "I have found some amazing people who want to share their knowledge with the community to lead these classes,"

For example, a class on the "Lincoln Assassination" offered this June will be led by historian Bob Bowser, who has been a tour guide at the Dr. Samuel A. Mudd House for the past 13 years. The class will include both a classroom component and a visit to the Samuel Mudd House and will trace the role of Southern Maryland in Booth's plot.

"People don't realize how deep the history in our area is," added Holt.

Mike Callahan, a living history interpreter for Friends of Chapman State Park and other historical sites, will also be leading classes that highlight the history of our area. His popular "At Home with History" class, which kicks off on May 12, takes students into private homes in the area to learn about their historical and cultural significance. He also developed a day trip to visit the area's lighthouses based on feedback from students, which will be offered later in May.

"This is living history; it's bringing history alive," said Callahan. "I have always believed that if you can experience something, you are going to remember it a lot better. I hope people come away from the experiences I am leading with a deeper appreciation and our local history and an understanding of what it takes to be a steward of these properties."

The experiences will also take students out of the area to explore places they may not have discovered on their own. "Italian Day," which led by popular instructor Simonetta Baldassari on May 13, will take students to Washington, DC to visit the Casa Italiana Sociocultural Center for a guided tour. After the tour, participants will venture to Georgetown for authentic pizza, and even can help prepare it. CSM has arranged access and transportation to reach each destination, taking the stress out of an ambitious day trip.

Other experiences offered this spring cover everything from introduction to fly fishing, to dog training, and Holt said that new experiences are being planned for future sessions based on instructor and student interest.

"Everybody can find something that interests them when they look at our schedule," she said.

Calvert County pet licenses will also be available at the rabies clinics. Pet licenses are \$7 for spayed or neutered pets (proof required) and \$20 for those not spayed or neutered. A Calvert County pet license must be renewed every year and is required for all cats and dogs ages 5 months and older


