

## **Brewster: Data Shows Vaccines Effective**

SMC Fully Vaccinated by Age

"We continue to be in a very high transmission state," was the bottom-line message from St. Mary's County Health Officer Dr. Meenakshi Brewster during a Sept. 28 briefing to the county commissioners sitting as the Board of Health.


Brewster presented a series of slides showing the current status and historical local trends of the COVID-19 coronavirus. But the most alarming showed the number of new COVID cases for the last week was at an all-time high of 641 in the county, reflecting the Delta variant surge.

As she went through the data, her message from each data point was that the unvaccinated need to get their shots. "The data clearly shows the vaccines are effective," she said.

Regarding that 641peak number, Brewster said, "In fact, it's far greater than even the peak that we experienced back after the holidays, in the beginning of 2021. This likely is reflecting a variety of factors. Certainly, the in-person school for a few weeks, and then also, a variety of events that we've had in the Labor Day holiday and so forth, definitely contributed to the number of cases that we saw last week." It does not, however, include any effect of the county fair.

"The rates of new cases in those who are unvaccinated is far greater than the rate of new cases in those who are fully-vaccinated," she said. "We do see breakthrough cases, which is to be expected. No vaccine is a hundred percent."

She added, "We're also dealing with some level of waning immunity in some populations. When you have high transmission in the community, you're naturally going to get more breakthrough cases again, because the vaccines aren't a hundred percent effective,




but they are effective. They're strongly effective against severe illness, and they are very effective at preventing illness, from COV-ID itself." So, she said, and reiterated, "Getting vaccinated is the number one tool that we have right now to protect our whole community. While it may be an individual health decision, it's a decision that has far reaching impact on everyone in this community."

Booster shots are now available at the Hollywood VFD vaccination site on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays and sone Saturdays. You are encouraged to make an appointment through the health department website.

Brewster said about booster eligibility:

- Persons aged 12 and older with moderate/severe immune compromise (Moderna or Pfizer at least 28 days after 2<sup>nd</sup> dose).
- Age 65 and older (Pfizer recipients only, at least six months af-



ter 2<sup>nd</sup> dose)

- Age 18 and older with underlying medical condition (Pfizer recipients only, at least six months after 2<sup>nd</sup> dose).
- Age 18 and older with higher risk occupation or setting (Pfizer recipients only, at least six months after 2<sup>nd</sup> dose).

She said a doctor's proof of condition is not necessary.

The county has a 55-percent fully vaccinated rate. She was asked how that compares to others. She said, "A lot of other counties in Maryland have much higher vaccination rates."

Data shows lower rates in urban counties than rural, Brewster noted. "That's just the way it is, whether it's messaging, whether it's ideals, whether it's ideology."

As to the impact on counties, she said, "There's a big economic cost. If you think of these hospitalizations, they are incredibly expensive to employers, to the county, to public tax dollars. When people are sick and are quarantining and they're out of work, that's very expensive on employers. And it's hard on our industries and our infrastructure that rely upon those employees to provide services here locally, including our healthcare industry, which has taken care of the people that are getting sick.

With the flue season upon us, Brewster said it is okay to get a COVID shot ad flu shot at the same time, but not in the same arm.


Brewster supports wearing masks indoors and urged county government to post signs to that effect.

As to why people are resisting

getting vaccinated, she said, "I think a lot of it has to do with information that's out there that people are paying attention to. It's a pandemic. It's a new virus. These are new vaccines. We've had the vaccines now for several months and we've got great data on them; we probably have some of the best safety data on these vaccines than we have on any vaccines, because there's been so many people that have taken the vaccines and we've had months now to monitor them. There are some very strong beliefs and beliefs being perpetuated, especially on social media, that's inaccurate, and it's not scientifically or medically true. And unfortunately, a lot of people are believing it and paying attention to it and it's influencing what they believe.

Brewster was emphatic: "I think the data is very clear and shows what is true, which is that vaccines are effective and that the vaccines are protecting people from serious illness. They're not a hundred percent, but they are the most effective strategy that we have. And at a time when we have a very contagious variant of CO-VID-19 and we've got very high transmission here locally, and we have people who are not eligible to get vaccine, the under twelves in particular, who are very vulnerable now to getting exposed to this virus, it becomes even more imperative. I think for the rest of us who are age eligible to get vaccinated, to get the right information and to make that decision that will help protect not only us, but also protect our community."

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## **New Senate Maps Keep St. Mary's Intact**

The Maryland Citizens Redistricting Commission has offered a new congressional map that keeps St. Mary's County whole; a previous map that took a slice of the county from Mechanicsville down to California and gave it over to a senatorial district serving Anne Arundel and Calvert counties caused an uproar that led to protests to the commission at their Sept. 20 on-line meeting.


The new map, which still confers a sizeable piece of Charles County into a St. Mary's senate district, was developed from discussion at that same meeting, according to the redistricting commission.

"While this is not a final plan, it shows that your voice mattered in this process and that the Commission heard our concerns," said Sen. Jack Bailey in an e-mail to constituents.

"I am proud to have worked with Delegate [Matt] Morgan and excited to see that so many members of our community were involved to show the redistricting commission the importance of keeping St. Mary's County united."

The prior map that caused such a furor would have placed key economic development aspects, including the Airport Innovation District at the St. Mary's County Airport and the University of Maryland's new satellite campus dedicated to autonomous technological research, under the representation of a senator hours away, with a main constituency focused on entirely different interests.

Morgan, who represents Dist.



29A, called the previous map an attempt at gerrymandering St. Marv's.

Commissioner Todd County Morgan, who also rallied local support against the map that would have carved St. Mary's up between four other counties, said he was pleased that draft changes were made so quickly after the protests.

"I think the maps are signifi-cantly improved," said Morgan. "It recognizes the significant impact we have in the state."

The county is home to Patuxent River Naval Air Station and NAVAIR, which is a \$40 billion a year acquisition hub from which the county, and the state, benefits.

It was part of the piece of St. Mary's that would have gone to an Anne Arundel/Calvert County representative.

Morgan praised all those who rallied so quickly against the prior map, but also warned them.

We had to mount opposition otherwise they would have rolled over us," Morgan said. "It's not over yet; we have to stay vigilant on this."

## **3-Year-Old Child Drowns In Hollywood**



St. Mary's County Sheriff's Office deputies responded on Saturday, Sept. 25, to the 24700 block of Half Pone Point Road in Hollywood for the report of a missing child.

The mother reported that her three-year-old female child walked away from the residence. The child's parents and neighbors had already begun searching the area before deputies arrived.

Deputies, Maryland State Police, Trooper 7, Hollywood Volunteer Rescue Squad, Leonardtown Volunteer Rescue Squad and Calvert Search and Rescue continued the search of the area.

The three-year-old female was located nearby in the water and CPR was started. The child was transported to MedStar St. Mary's Hospital where she was declared deceased.

The sheriff's office Criminal Investigations Division continues its investigation, but at this time it appears to be an accidental drowning.

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## Wage to \$15 an Hour

The College of Southern Maryland (CSM) has raised its minimum wage from \$12 an hour for all fully benefited and part-time hourly staff members to \$15 an hour. The CSM Board of Trustee's voted unanimously at its Sept. 23 board meeting to formalize the salary structure confirming it effective as of July 1, 2021.

"It was important that we address fair and equitable compensation for members of the CSM team who serve our students with such dedication, and this decision delivers appropriate salaries that reflect today's real living wage requirements," said CSM President Dr. Maureen Murphy. "This move keeps us competitive within our industry as a preferred employer in the region and helps us retain the high caliber of employees that our students need and deserve."

The wage bump impacted 95 employees.

CSM is not the first college to meet this milestone. Inside Higher Education reported over the summer that several colleges raised their minimum wage "either by choice or by the laws of their jurisdictions" after many large employers such as Target, Amazon, Whole Foods, Costco and many fast food chains increased starting salaries to \$15 an hour to compete for labor.

Maryland's current minimum wage is \$11.75. In 2019, the Maryland General Assembly passed legislation raising the state's minimum wage in increments each year to \$15 an hour by 2025.

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## **CSM Increases Minimum Commissioners to Meet** with Legislators

Eight Proposals to be Presented

Commissioners of The St Mary's County will be presenting eight legislative proposals to the county delegation when they meet with them on Tuesday, Oct. 5. The public meeting will be at 6 p.m. in the Chesapeake Building at 41770 Baldridge Street, Leonardtown.

The commissioners at their Sept 28 meeting approved presenting the eight items, but two others were removed at the request of the commissioner who suggested it.

Commissioner John O'Cennor withdrew the request to give the commissioners more flexibility in determining the Emergency Services Support Tax. He said the county finances seemed to be in good enough shape that additional monies didn't need to be generated.

Commissioner President Randy Guy withdrew the proposal to increase the lodging tax from five to seven percent when there appeared to be opposition to it.

One of the eight proposals that will be submitted to the legislators came from a private citizen and the commissioners did not take any position on it but are simply forwarding it for consideration. Vernon Gray is proposing to put a three-term limit on elected school board members. Even though they didn't vote, O'Connor said he supported term limits.

Gray, in his letter requesting the legislation, said, "It is a fallacious argument that term limits can always be imposed by the ballot box. Incumbents can perhaps insulate themselves from voter-imposed term limits by cultivating a constituency of public service employees, and the favor of the teacher's union."

The commissioners unanimously approved presenting a proposal from Director of Emergency Services Steve Walker allowing animal control officers to wear body cameras. County Attorney David Weiskopf said they are not sworn officers and are thus not covered by state law for police officers.

Weiskopf said they can now wear body cameras, but they



would have to get the consent of the person being recorded before using it. He said that could present awkward situations.

Guy noted the cameras would come in handy for proof if the animal control officer had to shoot an attacking vicious animal.

Another proposal unanimously approved would remove the provision that a newspaper had to be paid in order for it to receive legal notices from the county. Weiskopf noted that a free publication (The County Times) has a circulation of 10,000 and met all the other criteria for running legal notices.

## **Hundreds Gather for Hoyer Bull Roast**

#### Sen. Mike Miller Remembered

"We miss Mike Miller," said Congressman Steny Hoyer. Although the occasion was Hoyer's annual bull roast which coincides with his birthday (this year the 82<sup>nd</sup>), the late long-time Maryland Senate president and Calvert County resident was on the minds of many of the attendees from around the sprawling 5<sup>th</sup> Congressional District.

Miller for years was master of ceremonies for the Hoyer event. Hoyer noted that both politicians served parallel public careers throughout their political life, which for Hoyer has been 53 years, including 41 as congressman. He intends to run again next year.

He had some hard edges," Hoyer said of Miller. "But he had a heart of gold."

Prince George's Congressman and former Maryland lieutenant governor Anthony Brown took over the MC role and gently poked Hoyer. He observed that Hoyer had lost two gubernatorial bids and Brown only one. There were a number of gubernatorial candidates in the crowd who hope to wrest the seat from the GOP as Governor Larry Hogan is term limited.

The Sept. 24 event was held at the Newton-White mansion in Mitchellville, in a Prince George's County park. Hoyer's roots are in Prince George's, although he currently lives in St. Mary's.

Among the attendees were U.S. Senator Chris Van Hollen, former Governor Parris Glendening and many local officials from the counties in the district, including Calvert and St. Mary's.

Hoyer harkened back to the storming on the U.S. Capitol earlier this year, which he blamed on former president Donald Trump. He said what happened should have been "a wakeup call that we can't take this great democracy for granted."

Observing that the country is severely divided, he said, "We really need to come together."



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## Partnership to Counter Increase in Overdose Deaths

Lt. Governor Boyd K. Rutherford Sept. 27 announced a new partnership between the Maryland State Police (MSP), Maryland Department of Health (MDH), and National Institute of Standards and Technology to identify dangerous illicit drugs and better understand the overdose risk to individuals living with substance use disorders.

"Collaborations at the nexus of public health and public safety are critical to preventing drug overdoses and deaths," said Lt. Governor Rutherford. "This is important work—especially given the increased intentional and unintentional use of fentanyl, which accounted for nearly 93% of all opioid-related deaths and 83% of all fatal overdoses in the first six months of the year."

The groundbreaking Rapid Analysis of Drugs pilot initiative will test prescription opioids, heroin, fentanyl, and drug paraphernalia collected by law enforcement and harm reduction programs to identify the composition and potency of those drug samples. The partnership will improve law enforcement agencies' understanding of the drug market and ability to work with harm reduction programs to educate individuals who use drugs on ways to stay safe.

"The Rapid Analysis of Drugs program provides Maryland with an opportunity to substantially increase its ability to monitor the drug supply in the state," said Secretary Dennis Schrader of MDH. "The information provided by the program will help us to communicate the dangers of these drugs even more effectively and ultimately save more lives."

The pilot program will test drugs and paraphernalia using a Direct Analysis in Real Time (DART) Mass Spectrometer, which details the contents of drugs within minutes. Analysts are expected to test up to 100 samples each week through December 2021.

"For police, there is no other drug detection test available in the field to provide almost instantaneous results with such high accuracy rates. The immediate feedback to the criminal investigators is invaluable," said Colonel Woodrow W. "Jerry" Jones III, superintendent of the MSP. "The innovative instrument also allows for enhanced collaboration with public health organizations."

Also, the Opioid Operational Command Center (OOCC) and MDH released a second quarter report featuring data related to deadly overdoses from alcohol and drugs, including opioids and fentanyl, from January through June of this year. During the first six months of 2021, health officials reported 1,358 confirmed unintentional overdose deaths involving drugs and alcohol compared to 1,351 overdose deaths during the same time period in 2020. Opi-

oids accounted for 1,217, or nearly 90%, of overdose deaths reported through June 2021 compared to 1,204 deadly overdoses in 2020.

"Although the current environment remains difficult for people struggling with the disease of addiction, the data in our report appear to represent an encouraging development," said OOCC Executive Director Robin Rickard. "Many people are still hurting, but we may be witnessing a slowing of the overdose fatality rate in Maryland."

Earlier this year, the OOCC and MDH released data through March 2021 that showed an increase of 5.7 percent in fatal overdoses involving all substances as compared to the first three months of 2020. This followed a 17.7% annual increase in 2020. The OOCC has developed a new public dashboard to report fatal and non-fatal opioid overdoses in Maryland, which includes data provided by the Vital Statistics Administration and the MDH Office of Preparedness and Response and the Maryland Institute for Emergency Medical Services Systems.

In July, the Hogan-Rutherford administration launched the Maryland Stop Overdose Strategy, or "Maryland SOS," in response to the increase in overdose rates observed during the first year of the COVID-19 pandemic. The campaign utilizes \$10 million for grant funding, regional town hall meetings, as well as state, local, and community partnerships to address the consequences of and factors contributing to the opioid crisis in ways that align with Maryland's Inter-Agency Opioid Coordination Plan.

Input from Maryland SOS regional town halls will help inform decisions on how to utilize money available through the Opioid Restitution Fund. The Opioid Restitution Fund was established in 2019 to help guide the allocation of funds that Maryland receives through legal action against opioid manufacturers and distributors.






#### Sheriff's Office Seeking Theft Suspect



The Blessing of the Fleet has dealt with several struggles in recent years. Declining attendance resulted in the 7<sup>th</sup> District Optimists Club reducing the scope of the fair to one day in 2018 with a brief resurgence to two days in 2019 before completely cancelling their largest fundraising event in 2020 due to COVID-19.

Now the club is just days away from reopening the Blessing of the Fleet for the  $53^{rd}$  time, if not in consecutive years.

The Optimists are banking on good weather and the community's desire to push more and more towards normal after a punishing two years of mask mandates, viral surges and social distancing.

Each of the more than 50 Blessings of the Fleet that have come before have included a parade, entertainment for families, rides and games for children, booths exhibiting local crafters, food and drink vendors, stage shows and a fireworks display at the end of the first day of the festival.

The Blessing of the Fleet started more than 50 years ago as a project by the 7th District Optimist Club to bring the community together and also as an opportunity for local Catholic clergy to bless the many fishing boats that once trolled local waters. It was also intended to draw attention to St. Clement's Island, which was shrinking due to erosion.

This year's event, which helps fund the club's scholarships and activities for county youth, will be a replica of the 2019 Blessing of the Fleet, running from Oct. 2 to Oct. 3.

John Laychak, organizer of the Blessing of the Fleet for the 7th District Optimists Club, said masks will not be required at the event but they will be made available to guests if they want one.

The Blessing offers much entertainment for children and adults and is firmly a family affair; the two main acts are local singer and country recording artist Robbie Boothe and from Pennsylvania, The Amish Outlaws.

Leadership at the Optimists Club had the out-of-town musical entertainment committed back in the spring.

Laychak said the out-of-town entertainment has drawn crowds to many of their other shows and he hopes they will do the same for the Blessing of the Fleet this year.

"They are a popular group and they are a fun group," Laychak said.

The Amish Outlaws, billed as being, "straight outta Lancaster," is comprised of six members, four of whom once belonged to the Amish community but decided not to be baptized into the Amish church.

"In the years since Rumspringa, the members of the Amish Outlaws have become very well acclimated to the pleasures and vices of the modern world... music, most of all," their Web site reads. "Thus, with a bold lust for life and a fire for music and performance that can only come from 16 years of repression, The Amish Outlaws were unleashed upon the world."

The Amish Outlaws are a cover band, able to play most anything from Ludacris to Black Sabbath.

The Amish Outlaws are set to perform Saturday, Oct. 2 on the grounds of St. Clements Island Museum, at 7:30p.m.

The gates to the event open at noon on Saturday, with the first boat from the shore shuttling visitors to St. Clements Island where they can visit the first landing of English colonists in 1634.

The Blackistone Lighthouse will also be open after much renovation by volunteers with the St. Clements Hundred group.

At 1p.m. the Blessing of the Fleet, the 15 boats used to harvest the local waters, as well as the bestowing of the award for Waterman of the Year.

From 2p.m. to 3p.m. dance and acrobatics troupes will perform; the last boat to St. Clements Island will

launch at 3:30p.m. with the light-house closing at 4p.m.

Starting at 5:30 p.m. the evening's musical entertainment begins with Robbie Boothe followed by The Amish Outlaws.

Food and drink vendors will be open through the day but will close concessions at 9:15p.m.

The annual fireworks show will start at 9p.m.

Throughout both days of the event arts and crafts vendors will also be on hand as well as fun activities on museum grounds.





Many - if not most - people living in St Mary's County have only a vague idea of what the county was like before the Patuxent Naval Air Station was installed at Cedar Point. The surroundings and roads which we take for granted today are a far cry from what was here before World War II. Cedar Point itself was an area of farms and a couple of small villages, Pearson being the most notable among them. In a real sense, the County owes its economic wellbeing to World War II.

Before the base, there was little industry in the County – just a few general stores and garages. Most activity cen-

tered around tobacco farming, oystering, and crabbing. And bootlegging.

With few opportunities, young people left the County and went north, to Washington, DC, and other more populated and industrialized areas. Murray E Jackson, a former state trooper, recounted as much in his oral history at the Maryland State Archives. "In 1941, the county had less than fifteen thousand people in it" and had not recovered from the effects of the Depression. There was high unemployment. "Most of the young people who went away to college never came back because they found work in the city and elsewhere, because there wasn't anything to attract them here.

Transportation to and within the county was difficult. Few roads were paved and the main arteries – Route 5 and Three Notch Road – were not at all what they are today.

Murray Jackson again: "You know there was one two-lane,

twisting road from Waldorf down here. That's the only way you could get here! Route Five came, that was the principal road down here. It was a little old two-lane road...there were many roads built in the early days, in the twenties and thirties, that were only eight to ten feet wide, because there wasn't any need to build them any wider.

And they were saving money. Later on, the state came along, and they put a concrete lane on the side of that road to make it wider...There was no attempt to straighten curves and go cut down hills and things of that nature. It was a torturous trip down here from, say, Waldorf."

There were no bridges across the Patuxent River. To get to Calvert County, you took a boat or drove up Route Five to the Crain Highway to Upper Marlboro then down into Calvert County. A trip from Leonardtown to Price Frederick could take up to three hours over very poor roads.

When we're zipping along Route Five or Three Notch Road, try to imagine life back in the '30s and early '40s. Certainly slower and a lot more challenging.



Robbie grew up surrounded by excellence. A child of the 1980s, his home was tucked between San Francisco and the Silicon Valley. To his north, the 49ers, with a roster full of future Hall of Famers, were winning multiple Super Bowls and running an innovative, pass-heavy offense that would revolutionize football. In the famed Valley to the south, some of the country's greatest minds were developing technologies that would change the course of human history.

Despite the notable intellectual and athletic incubator, Robbie could best be described as unassuming. True to that characterization, as adulthood and college beckoned, Robbie shunned flashy Valley feeder schools and California-based athletic powers for a somewhat unglamorous, coldweather, mid-western institution. It was here, thousands of miles from home, where Robbie showed some promise; still, his arc indicated "solid contributor" more than star.

Post-college employment moved Robbie even farther from home, all the way to a firm located outside of Boston, Massachusetts. After a brief internships of sorts, Robbie capitalized on some breaks, tapped into the exceptional geographic roots of his childhood, and began a meteoric rise within the company that saw both employee and employer become industry leaders.

A decade later, and years after his surprise ascension, Robbie received a mid-career boost with the arrival of a unique colleague.

Tommy was Robbie's opposite, in personality and journey. Where Robbie was measured, poised, calculating, disciplined and maybe even a bit boring, Tommy was impulsive, fun-loving and goofy. Tommy's plan was to crush life that day; the future – even tomorrow – was of little apparent concern. Unlike Robbie's personal journey from west to east, Tommy had traveled from his childhood home in upstate New York, to the desert southwest for college and back to the Boston area for employment and the fortuitous career intersection with Robbie.

On paper, this relationship was as unlikely to work as it was to happen at all. But life often crafts stories beyond any writer's imagination. Robbie and Tommy were a fantastic pair and spent nine decorated years together at their Boston corporate home.

Tommy, always the eccentric, was the first to leave, taking a year-long sabbatical of sorts to indulge other interests (i.e. to have fun). After one additional year in Boston, Robbie left the firm too, but true to his workobsession, he took an immediate lateral position with a new company in Florida. A fresh start and the sunshine were enough to coax Tommy off the fun train and he joined Robbie in Florida to reconstitute the dynamic duo. Their impact was significant. Despite a choppy start, Robbie and Tommy rallied the new organization and, just as they had done numerous times in Boston, quickly transformed it into the envy of the industry.

The trained eye identified "Robbie" as Tom Brady and "Tommy" as his long-time, lovable teammate Rob Gronkowski. Sports often create amazing connections, as measured by both accomplishment and improbability, between players that re-write record books and bring years of joyous moments and a lifetime of memories to fans. Brady and Gronk, with their decade of excellence and four shared Super Bowl championships, certainly qualify.

In contemplating all the fortunate factors that aligned for Brady and Gronk to meet and be delivered to the world, the tendency is to scan one's own life and career for similar gems on our personal rosters. A group of teenagers from different towns, mavbe even different states, choose the same college, are placed at random in a quad together, and become lifelong friends. A resume is submitted in response to a job announcement, an interview follows, a job is started and an invaluable mentor is found. On a whim, a person decides to accompany a group of friends for a few drinks, meets an interesting stranger later that night, numbers...and eventually nuptials...are exchanged.

What are the odds? Can it be attributed to sheer luck or was something more powerful and mysterious in play? Whatever the cause, count me grateful for the favorable intersections in my life – the Brady to my Gronk or the Gronk to my Brady, if you will - and hopeful for more; I trust I'm not alone.

### SELECTING THE BEST INVESTMENT VECHICLES FOR YOUR RETIREMENT

We've discussed the importance of asset allocation to your success as an investor. Harry Moscowitz won a Nobel prize for inventing modern portfolio theory in 1954 based on the concept that if you allocate your assets across a broad enough spectrum of equity, fixed-income and other types of investments, and one of your investments declines in value, the others are likely to take up the slack and keep your investment returns on an even keel.

Pundits refer to asset allocation as the "Rule of 92" meaning 92% of your success as an investor is directly attributable to whether you allocate your assets or not.

Ok, now we know that allocation is the way to go. But, one big problem with asset allocation is, how does an ordinary investor select the proper allocation of stocks versus bonds? The big mutual fund companies like T. Rowe Price, Vanguard, BlackRock and others think they have it all figured out. They do the allocation for you.

#### TARGET DATE FUNDS:

Target date funds contain a mixture of stocks, bonds and cash. They have a future date in the title you can select to correspond to your retirement date. As you get older, the asset allocation within the fund changes and gets more conservative over time. The fund manager will put fewer assets into stocks which are inherently risky as you get closer to retirement. You do not have to take any action. The fund manager does that for you. You simply pick the date when you think vou will retire. For example, suppose you will turn sixty-five in 2020. You pick the 2020 Retirement Fund. You can buy the fund at any age and with a minimum investment, but the target date is what matters.

The big boost for target date funds came in 2006 when pension laws changed so that employers could choose investments for employees who had not designated investments for their 401(k) plans. Target date mutual funds became the most popular investments for employers to offer and to use as a default if employees failed to designate anything else. Fidelity launched its target date funds in 1996; Vanguard in 2003 and T. Rowe Price in 2002—together, those three fund companies control about 75% of the market. Fees for the allocation are included the cost of the funds themselves

#### LIFECYCLE MUTUAL FUNDS

Lifecycle funds include cash, stock

and bonds and may include both U.S. and foreign securities. The percentage of funds in each asset class is determined by the fund manager who attempts to earn the highest return possible by switching portfolio weightings in each type of asset class by market conditions. Lifecycle funds generally include three or four "portfolios" with varying percentages of funds in each asset class. The portfolios are designed by fit investors of various ages or risk tolerance levels. For example, Vanguard has a LifeStrategy fund with four asset choices: income (lowest percentage of stock in the portfolio), conservative growth, moderate growth and growth (highest percent of stock in the portfolio). As with target date funds, fees for allocation are included in the cost of the funds.

#### ACTIVE MANAGEMENT

Active management involves the use of a portfolio manager who works directly with you on your investments. This clearly is the most custom tailored to your wishes. Your portfolio may include everything from securities to real estate. The manager in this case reviews all of your assets and your personal goals with you and selects those types of investments that will give you the most return for a risk that meets your expectations. The upside of professional management is that your strategy is tailored for you. No one except the portfolio manager is going to ask about the strategy you have to exit your small business, for example. That question, along with many others, should be asked by the portfolio manager in order to provide the best retirement approach for you. The fees involved will be a percentage of the assets and, as your assets grow, the fees will grow. This means at the very least that the portfolio manager has a vested interest in seeing your portfolios grow.

Whether you choose target date, lifecycle or active management, the principal is the same. Your success as an investor and an investor preparing for retirement will be directly attributable to whether you allocate your assets or not. As usual, I advise you to investigate before you invest. Take a look at all of the options available to you first, then decide. No one will protect you like yourself.
