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

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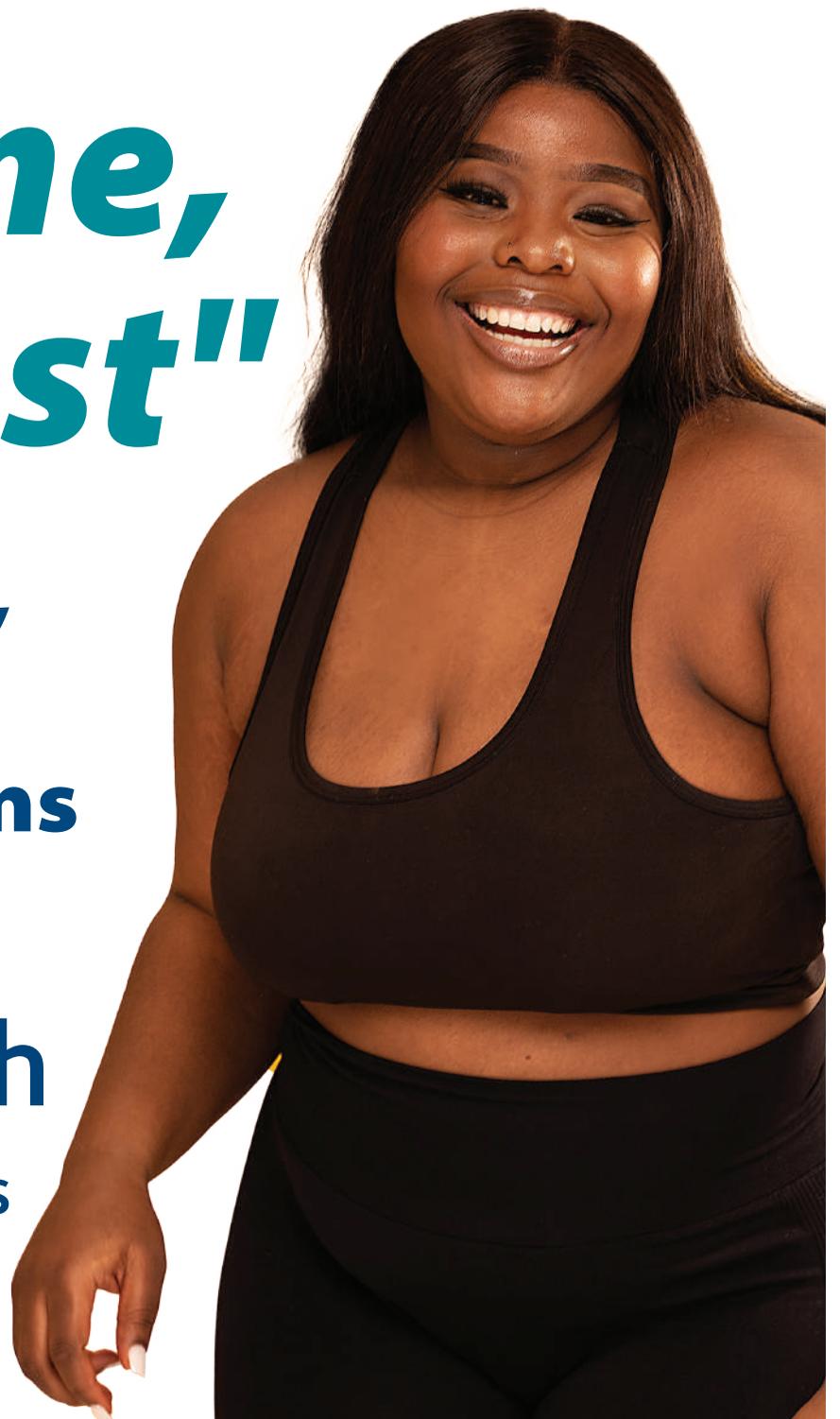



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# Post Re-Elected School Board President

Jana Smith Post has been re-elected president of the Calvert County Board of Education. Lisa Grenis has been re-elected vice president. The vote is held yearly.

The unanimous vote of confidence came at the board's Jan. 15 meeting.

Post has guided the board through a tumultuous year, with repeated criticism, largely over the board's DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) policies, including removing the board's Anti-Racism Policy.

The school board website says of Post, "Jana Post grew up in Calvert County and is a graduate of Northern High School. She has four children enrolled in CCPS and is an active member of the community. Jana currently serves as the President of the Calvert Aquatics Club and has previously served as the President of the PTSO and as Treasurer of a local Girl Scout Troop. Her education and experience include project management, human resource management, budget development, as well as expertise in procurement and contracts at both the federal and local levels of government.

"Jana's goals are to foster strong relationships between the Board of Education (BOE) members, parents, teachers, and staff by ensuring that their ideas are considered and their concerns addressed to enhance the educational experience. During her time as a board member, she aims to build relationships with other BOE members at the local and state levels and to refocus on academics in education."

Post is up for re-election this year. She has not yet announced her intentions.

The website says of Grenis, "Lisa Grenis is a retired educator who taught for 26 years, the majority of which were spent in Calvert County. In addition to teaching, she served as a Learning Specialist, where she collaborated with teachers and students to provide targeted instruction aimed at increasing academic achievement. She was also an active parent volunteer and has two children who gradu-

ated from Calvert County Public Schools. "During her career, Lisa Grenis held several leadership roles, including serving as a grade-level team leader. She organized academic after-school programs for students and parents, served as President of the Southern Maryland Reading Council, and presented at both local and state teacher conferences. She was nominated for Teacher of the Year by the staff at Huntingtown Elementary and co-authored an article for the *Literacy Issues and Practices* journal.

"In the wake of the pandemic, Lisa Grenis's goals are to ensure that students get back on track academically, with a focus on excelling in the basics and preparing for future paths in either college or technical training. She advocates for full transparency across the school system for parents, teachers, and students.

"Additionally, Lisa is committed to fiscal responsibility and represents a common-sense approach to education, one that promotes a curriculum with high standards."

Grenis is also up for re-election this year. She has filed for re-election, and so far has no opposition.

The Independent Investigations Division (IID) of the Maryland Office of the Attorney General today released the body-worn camera footage from the fatal police-involved collision involving the Calvert County Sheriff's Office that occurred on Friday, December 12, 2025, in Prince Frederick. The decedent was previously identified as 58-year-old Servon Gatewood of Lusby.

# Schools Efficiency Report Released

Interim Superintendent of Schools Dr. Marcus Newsome and school board members are trying to get their heads around a 500-page Efficiency Report released last week by a consultant. The report, ordered by the board to do just what the title implies, will be discussed by the board on Feb. 12.

Newsome told the board at their Jan. 15 meeting that he considers the outcome a report on steroids.

Newsome said, "The board voted to contract with Public Works to do a comprehensive efficiency assessment of the school district in the areas of finance, human resources, information technology, instruction, special education, and student transportation. Pupil services and facilities were not part of that package, but they added that in the fourth week of December. They conducted over 200 face-to-face interviews, and they posted a survey where we had over 800 of our employees who responded. Today I actually received the first draft of that report. It's well over 500 pages. It is more detailed than we can get our arms around in a short period of time. We'll have the project manager, Dr. Joanne Cox, who will be here on your board

meeting on February 12<sup>th</sup> to present the final report," he said.

Newsome added, "Then our team will get together and start to develop a particular plan to begin implementing the recommendations. This was specifically targeted for the central office so that we can determine more efficient and effective ways to support our schools and our students."

# Fire Departments Awarded Wildfire Protection Grants

The Maryland Department of Natural Resources Forest Service is providing Volunteer Fire Assistance grants to 55 volunteer fire departments in 17 counties across the state. The funded projects help volunteer fire companies enhance wildland fire protection in rural communities.

For the 2025 grant cycle, finalized in December, the Maryland Forest Service is providing \$167,314 in match funding to complete \$370,376 in total project cost. The grants match up to 50 percent of project cost with a maximum grant of \$3,500 per department. For this grant cycle, all but two Maryland applicants received a grant.

Funding for this program is provided by the USDA Forest Service.

1. CSPR-143112, **Calvert County Industrial Park Lot 3R**, located at 171 Skipjack Road, Prince Frederick, Lot 3R in the Calvert County Industrial Park, zoned Light Industrial. Proposed redevelopment of a portion of the 4.5-acre lot by demolishing the existing office and constructing a new two-story office building in its place. It is further proposed to repave the southern portion of the site and to construct a storage warehouse and wall to segregate parking between the storage building yard & adjacent flex space tenants. # CSM Receives \$100K to Launch Radiation Therapy Program

The College of Southern Maryland (CSM) Foundation received a \$100K gift from the Wills Group to support a new career pathway in radiation therapy.

The Radiation Therapy Program will train students to administer radiation treatments and operate industry standard laboratory equipment to provide high-quality healthcare while helping to meet a critical need in the healthcare workforce.

CSM President Dr. Yolanda Wilson said this investment will have a significant impact by opening new career pathways for students while advancing the college's mission to address evolving regional workforce needs.

"At CSM we are committed to listening to our community partners and creating academic pathways that align with workforce demands," Wilson said. "I'm grateful for the opportunity to work with the Wills Group to support our students' academic and economic success while strengthening care services for those in need across Southern Maryland."

According to the American Society of Radiologic Technologists (ASRT), a 2024 national staffing survey indicates the vacancy rate for radiation therapists is more than 13 percent, an increase of about three percent from 2022.

The program will train and prepare the next generation of radiation therapists and assistants to support hospitals and outpatient cancer care centers with patient care and administering treatments.

Jeremy Bradford, CEO of CalvertHealth, said having a radiation therapy program in

the region will make a significant impact on a critical healthcare need.

"Radiation therapists play a critical role in cancer care, and like many healthcare professions, the demand for these highly skilled clinicians continues to grow," Bradford said. "Launching a Radiation Therapy program in Southern Maryland is an important step toward addressing a regional workforce shortage while creating meaningful career pathways for students who want to serve their community."

The gift will further support the establishment of the Anne and Blackie Wills Radiation Lab, a state-of-the-art facility located in the Health Sciences Building on the Regional Hughesville Campus.

Julian "Blackie" Wills III, President and CEO of the Wills Group, said this gift reflects a long-standing commitment to giving back to Southern Maryland.

"At the Wills Group, we've always believed that investing in people is one of the most meaningful ways to strengthen our community," said Wills. "CSM has a long history of creating access to education and career opportunities right here in Southern Maryland. We're proud to support a program that not only prepares students for meaningful, in-demand careers, but also helps ensure our region has the skilled healthcare professionals needed to care for our neighbors."

CSM is preparing to launch the radiation therapy program in FY27.

## Kit Spalding, 99



Katherine Ann (Kit) Spalding of Leonardtown, Maryland died peacefully just hours after her 99<sup>th</sup> birthday in the early morning hours of January 14, 2026.

She was born January 13, 1927 to the late Francis Xavier and Elizabeth Claire (Thompson) Spalding. She was the oldest of 9 siblings and was also the first grandchild on the Thompson side and received lots of attention from her grandparents and older relatives. Her life changed drastically after her mother died from childbirth complications when she was 13. At that time, she had just graduated from 8<sup>th</sup> grade at St. John's and was ready to enter high school. Her mother's sudden death, left her father to raise her and her siblings by himself. He did so while working a job and farming and with the help of relatives who remained active and involved in their lives.

Upon completion, she was sent as a nun (Sister Mary Celestine) and registered nurse to Alabama where she was the only registered nurse at a hospital opened by the church that served African Americans in a time when the south was still very segregated. From 1947 to 1948 she was a member of the Cadet Nurse Corps, America's first uniformed service corps for women initiated during World War II. She was very proud of her time as a cadet and her service to her country. Kit continued her nursing and her education with a Bachelor's in Nursing and a Masters in Psychiatric Nursing. She left the convent after 25 years and supported the state of Maryland where she supervised community mental health facilities focusing

on children and families until her retirement.

She always knew she'd return to her family and to St. Mary's County. She was pleased to live her "golden years" in Cedar Lane Apartments in Leonardtown where she continued to enjoy community style living where you looked out for your neighbors. She enjoyed quilting, playing cards, art classes, coffee get togethers and many other forms of socialization.

In the last 2 ½ years, due to medical problems that left her unable to continue living independently, Kit was a resident of St. Mary's Nursing Home. She still had a sharp mind and many opinions and remained the family matriarch. She continued to keep up on all family happenings and still participated in many family events. She was in her glory when surrounded by the little ones. Her relationship with the Lord never wavered over the years. She remained a faithful servant of God and no matter what hand was dealt to her she knew the Lord would see her through. If you asked her how she was, 99.9% of the time, she was "good enough."

Kit is survived by her sister, Susan Miedzinski, many nieces and nephews, great nieces and nephews, and great great nieces and nephews. She was extremely proud of her family and continued to know the names of all the little ones even though the number kept (and keeps) growing.

# Considerations for Retirees Thinking of Working Part-Time

Retirement is an opportunity to wave goodbye to the daily grind. Retirees may focus on rest and relaxation, and many make travel a major component of their lifestyle.

According to a 2022 Gallup poll, Americans expect to retire at an average age of 66, up from 62 in 2022. However, most do not hold out that long; the average actual retirement age is 61. Canada used to have a mandatory retirement age of 65, but that mandate was overturned in 2009. Today, the average retirement age for Canadians is 64.4 for men and 63.8 for women, according to Statistics Canada.

Upon retiring, many retirees discover that they sorely miss getting out of the house and being productive through some sort of employment. Others may find it necessary to supplement their retirement incomes. There are a few things to know about working during retirement, particularly if a person is collecting government benefits.

- According to the Social Security Administration, those falling under full retirement age for the entire year (which was raised to age 67 for those born in 1960 or later) will be subjected to an SSA deduction of \$1 from your benefit payments for every \$2 you earn above the annual limit. For 2022, that limit



is \$19,560. In the year you reach full retirement age, SSA deducts \$1 in benefits for every \$3 you earn above a different limit, but they only count earnings before the month you reach your full retirement age. For full retirement age reached in 2022 your limit on earnings for the months before full retirement age is \$51,960. After full retirement age,

there is no limit on earnings.

- The Financial Consumer Agency of Canada reports that individuals between the ages of 60 and 65 who continue to work while receiving a Canadian Pension Plan (CPP) retirement benefit must still contribute to the CPP. Your CPP contributions will go toward post-retirement benefits.

These benefits increase your retirement income when you stop working. However, if you continue to work while getting a CPP retirement pension and are between the ages of 65 and 70 years old, you can choose not to make any more CPP contributions.

- Keep in mind that if you are on Medicare, extra income could potentially trigger surcharges for parts B and D. It's beneficial to speak with a financial consultant to weigh the pros and cons of part-time work during retirement.
- Part-time work does not need to be daily work. Many retirees work according to how they feel. Some options include seasonal jobs, such as driving shuttles in national parks or working during the holidays in retail stores. Or you may use your expertise to consult or start a business.
- A number of people work part-time during retirement simply to get out of the house. Jobs that help you interact with a number of people can be beneficial, as socialization has been shown to benefit the mental health of seniors. Working during retirement can supplement savings and provide structure that some retirees may be missing.

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# Changes That Could Arise from the 'Silver Tsunami'



A report from the International Monetary Fund in the summer of 2023 indicated that a new challenge awaits the world in the coming years. The global population increased by one billion people between 2010 and 2022. That remarkable increase saw the world surpass the eight billion people mark in November of 2022.

Despite a sharp increase in the global population in such a short period of time, the IMF asserts that the population boom is not the most formidable demographic challenge facing the world. The IMF defines population aging as the most formidable challenge.

Estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau indicate roughly 56 million Americans had reached age 65 by 2020, which marked a nearly 39 percent increase since 2010. Widely referred to as the "silver tsunami," a term credited to the AARP, the increase in the number of individuals age 65 and older could lead to some unique changes in countries across the globe.

- **Strain on public programs:** An aging population could stretch government resources thin in the decades to come. In fact, a 2018 report from the Hutchins Center on Fiscal and Monetary Policy noted that the federal government could face considerable challenges as more of its budget is allocated to age entitlement programs such as Social Security and Medicare. That problem may not prove unique to the United States, as the United Nations estimates that the elderly population in Europe is expected to account for around 30 percent of all residents by 2050. Though entitlement programs differ from country to country, finding ways to successfully manage the silver tsunami could be imperative to various nations' financial stability in the decades to come.
- **Increased recreation spending:** Sixty-five has traditionally been viewed as retirement age, and that remains an

unofficial bar for individuals living in countries like the United States that have increased their official retirement age. Though an uptick in the aging population is often framed in terms of the challenges countries will face, that increase also could present some opportunities. For example, a recent AARP Longevity Economy Outlook report noted that people 50 and older account for the most spending on recreation and culture of any demographic. That could prove beneficial to businesses and regions that cater to consumers interested in recreation.

- **Employment opportunities:** The AARP also noted the role the 50 and older population plays in supporting jobs. In 2020, the demographic of people 50 and older supported roughly one-third of the world's jobs and generated \$23 trillion in labor income with its spending on goods and services. Estimates from the AARP indicate that individuals age 50 and older will support 1.5 billion jobs across the globe by 2050. The labor income impact by then will more than double to \$53 billion.
- **Employment challenges:** Though the silver tsunami could help to maintain existing jobs and create plenty of new ones, employers might find it difficult to fill those positions. As more of the global population reaches retirement age, it bears noting that more workers will retire. Deloitte and the Manufacturing Institute note that the manufacturing sector will need to fill 2.5 million job openings related to retirements between 2020 and 2030. That could prove a sizable challenge, as the aging population is increasing at a time when the young population is decreasing.

The aging population is increasing, which could lead to a number of opportunities and challenges in the decades to come.

# Tips for Seniors to Safeguard Their Mental Health



The wide-ranging impact and reach of mental health issues garnered considerable attention during the COVID-19 pandemic, when the virus as well as mandates designed to reduce its spread led to increased feelings of anxiety and isolation. Since then, life has returned to normal for billions of people across the globe, but many people, including seniors, continue to experience mental health issues.

The Pan American Health Organization reports that at least one in four older adults experiences a mental disorder such as depression, anxiety or dementia. And those figures will likely only grow, as population estimates indicate seniors will make up a greater percentage of the global population in the years to come. Seniors dealing with mental health issues may feel helpless, but there's much they can do to safeguard their mental health.

- **Socialize regularly.** A 2019 study published in *The Journals of Gerontology, Series B: Psychological Sciences and Social Sciences* found that older adults who socialized with people beyond their circle of family and close friends were more likely to have greater positive moods and fewer negative feelings. Unfortunately, a significant percentage of older adults report feeling isolated from others. According to the University of Michigan National Poll on Healthy Aging that was conducted in January 2023, one in three older adults reported infrequent contact (once a week or less) with people from outside their home.
- **Speak with a mental health professional.** Among the more troubling aspects of the mental health crisis affecting seniors is that the PAHO reports two-thirds of older adults with

mental health problems do not get the treatment they need. Speaking with a mental health professional can help older adults in myriad ways. Such professionals can identify the issue that is prompting seniors to seek help and offer suggestions that can improve overall health and quality of life. Roundstone Insurance notes that reliance on digital behavioral health tools, including telehealth, was turned to both during the pandemic and ever since, and seniors can utilize such services if they have limited mobility and/or no one to help them make it to in-person appointments.

- **Volunteer.** Many older adults are retired, and while ample free time may have seemed like the ultimate reward after a lifetime of working, many retirees experience a void once their life no longer has the structure that work can provide. According to the independent nonprofit HelpGuide.org, retirement depression can compel retirees to feel as though they miss the sense of identity, meaning and purpose that came with their jobs, which can make some feel depressed, aimless and isolated. Volunteering can help fill the void created by retirement, and the positive mental health effects of volunteering are well-documented. According to the Mayo Clinic, studies have shown volunteering increases positive, relaxed feelings and gives volunteers a sense of meaning and appreciation.

No one is immune to mental health issues, including seniors. But older adults can take various steps to address their mental health and improve their overall health as a result.

# Senior-Friendly Interior Renovations



Grab bars in bathrooms can make homes safer for seniors with limited mobility.

Home is where the heart is. That sentiment may be especially true for seniors who have spent decades living in their homes. A lot of hard work goes into home ownership, and seniors who have lived in the same space for a while undoubtedly have countless memories within the walls of their homes.

A lifetime of experiences in a home can make it hard to leave, but many seniors experience diminished mobility as they age. Mobility issues can make it hard for seniors to traverse their homes, but aging homeowners can make various renovations to make a home more accessible.

- Revamp entryways and staircases. A 2020 study of 1,000 adults in the United Kingdom found that 28 percent of individuals age 65 and older who don't exercise regularly struggle with activities like walking up stairs. The study, commissioned by Total Fitness, also found that 14 percent of men and women over 65 who regularly engage in moderate exercise still find it challenging to climb up and down a flight of stairs. Seniors facing similar challenges can install a ramp at their home's entryway so they can comfortably go in and out. Inside, a chair lift can ensure seniors are not struggling to move from one floor to another.
- Raise the outlets throughout the home. They're easily overlooked, but outlets, particularly those outside the kitchen, tend to be close to the floor. AARP notes that's no accident, as outlets are generally placed at a height equal to the length of a hammer to save time with measuring when buildings are being constructed. Outlets close to the floor can be difficult for seniors with mobility issues to reach. Relocating the outlets a little higher off the floor is not an expensive renovation, but it

can make a home more accessible for seniors who have difficulty bending down or getting down on one knee.

- Install door knob extensions. Verywell Health notes that nearly half of all people age 65 and older have arthritis or another rheumatic condition. Arthritis can make it difficult for seniors to grip and turn door knobs. Door knob extensions can make it easier for seniors with arthritis to open the doors in their homes. Such extensions are roughly five-inch levers that can be installed over an existing door knob, making it easier to grab and pull down. Extensions save seniors the hassle of turning the knob, which some may find painful and almost impossible.
- Renovate the bathroom. Bathroom renovation projects can be costly, but seniors with mobility issues should know that bathrooms can pose a particularly dangerous threat. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes that roughly three million older adults are treated for fall injuries in emergency departments each year. A 2019 analysis published in The Journals of Gerontology noted that 22 percent of in-home falls resulted in a change in the person's walking ability. Replacing a step-over shower with a zero-step alternative can make it easier for seniors with mobility issues to get in and out of the shower, thus reducing their risk for falls. Grab bars along shower walls and a chair inside the shower can make it easier to bathe and towel off safely.

Seniors with mobility issues can make their homes more accommodating through an assortment of simple, yet effective renovations.

# Signs It Could Be Time to Consider an Assisted Living Facility

Assisted living facilities provide a vital service to families across the globe. In fact, more than 800,000 people in the United States are currently living in assisted living facilities, according to a 2023 report from Zippia, an online recruitment service that gathers information from the Bureau of Labor Statistics and its own internal data.

at home. If feelings of loneliness or depression are present, then the time might be right to make the move to an assisted living facility.

- Physical challenges: Many individuals move into assisted living facilities because the physical challenges of daily life have become too significant to handle alone. The NCOA notes that individuals who are feeling overwhelmed by tasks such as buying groceries, cooking and cleaning may benefit from moving into assisted living facilities that handle such tasks for them.
- Issues with hygiene: The presence of additional challenges related to hygiene also may suggest a move to an assisted living facility may be beneficial. Staff at assisted living facilities can help adults who are struggling to bathe, dress themselves or use a restroom on their own. Family members can look for signs that a loved one's personal hygiene has taken a turn for the worse. Issues with hygiene can be a byproduct of depression, and poor hygiene also can increase risk for infection and illness.
- Injuries: The NCOA notes that falls or near-falls are another potential sign that a person can benefit from moving to an assisted living facility. Falls can



hurt anyone, but they can be especially damaging to aging adults. For example, the National Institutes of Health report that falls may result in loss of independence, chronic pain and reduced quality of life. Assisted living facilities are often equipped with features to reduce risk of falls, such as grab bars in showers and bathrooms and even along corridor walls. In addition, assisted living facilities may be housed in single-story buildings or equipped with elevators,

which means residents won't be forced to navigate potentially dangerous staircases at any point during the day. Staff also can respond quickly if residents experience a fall, providing much-needed assistance that seniors living alone or with an aging spouse may not get at home.

Various signs may indicate that the time is right for individuals to move into an assisted living facility so they can more safely navigate daily life.

At 81, George Kirby insists he's trying to slow down, but his continued involvement in local service organizations suggests otherwise.

A retired school principal, Kirby has spent over a decade of his retirement with the Leonardtown Lions Club, serving as newsletter editor, zone chairman, district board member and club president.

The Leonardtown Lions Club is a local chapter of Lions Clubs International that focuses on vision and hearing support through services such as free screenings and recycling used eyeglasses.

Although Kirby no longer holds a formal leadership title and instead chooses to train newer members to take on those roles, his dedication to the club has not taken a backseat.

He continues to volunteer with the organization's vision and hearing programs, coordinating the vision and hearing mobile bus for county festivals and helping conduct screenings at schools and fire departments.

Kirby also serves on the board of directors for Lions Club District 22-C, which oversees clubs in southern Maryland and Washington, D.C., as well as on the board

of Lions Camp Merritt, which supports summer camps for children with disabilities and chronic illnesses.

From schools to service organizations, Kirby has long had a passion for helping children thrive. The free vision and hearing screenings are one of many ways he's been able to do this.

One memory he holds especially close

came from a screening at the county fair, where a young girl's grandparents brought her in for an exam. Since she was too young to read the alphabet, volunteers used a special camera designed for children who cannot identify letters.

The screening revealed a potential vision problem, and Kirby encouraged the family to follow up with a doctor.

Not long after, the family returned to thank the club, the child sporting her new pair of prescription glasses. The appointment had caught myopia, commonly known as nearsightedness, at an early stage.

Five years later, they returned to update the Lions and share their appreciation. Thanks to the condition being identified so early, their granddaughter no longer needed to wear glasses.

"If I could help one child, then I would have done my job. I've done my duty, I've met my goal," Kirby said. "As an educator and a people person who likes to work with kids, all of these things are another outlet for me outside of the classroom to do some of the same things."

For Kirby, retirement has simply meant continuing the same values that guided his career in education, connecting his passion for supporting children to his service experiences.

To seniors looking for ways to stay involved and give back to the community, Kirby encourages leaning on personal connections, whether that means joining a friend at a meeting or asking a neighbor to join you.

What keeps Kirby involved is not a sense of obligation, but that he enjoys the work he does and seeing its positive effects on the community.


Amazingly, this group of volunteers paid for their airfare, lodging, and meals for both of these missions to this poorest of countries in Central America.

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
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
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## College President Releases Report on 100-Day Listening Tour

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

# State Announces Community Development Projects Funding Included for Two in Leonardtown

The Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development today announced that Southern Maryland counties are set to receive a combined \$775,000 through the state's State Revitalization Programs for 3 projects and activities that promote community development and economic growth in the proposed Fiscal Year 2027 budget.

"These projects are ready to move forward and will play a role in communities achieving their visions, which supports a more resilient, economically competitive and affordable Maryland," said Gov. Moore. "The Moore-Miller Administration is committed to ensuring that every dollar awarded will help strengthen the places we call home."

The state's six State Revitalization Programs support revitalization and redevelopment projects and activities including: business expansion and retention; façade and streetscape improvements; homeownership and home rehabilitation incentives; commercial improvement programs; community facilities; mixed-use development, and demolition activities.

Projects in Calvert, Charles, and St. Mary's counties were selected through a competitively-scored, multi-agency review process used for the State Revitalization

Programs. These projects are:

- Acquisition and consolidation of lots outside of NSF Indian Head for future development (Indian Head, Charles County);
- Infrastructure and construction of expanded parking at the Leonardtown Wharf Public Park (Leonardtown, St. Mary's County);
- Continuation of minor improvements to properties within the downtown business district of Leonardtown (Leonardtown, St. Mary's County).

"Each one of these projects advances community-driven priorities tied to revitalization goals, and helps make great places – places that strengthen economic competitiveness and that people want to call home," said Jake Day, Secretary of the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development. ## Fire Departments Awarded Wildfire Protection Grants

# Pax River to Participate in Citadel Shield-Solid Curtain 2026



Naval Air Station Patuxent River will participate in the annual force protection exercise, Citadel Shield-Solid Curtain Jan. 26-Feb. 6.

Exercise Citadel Shield-Solid Curtain 2026 (CSSC26) is conducted by Commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command (USFFC) and Commander, Navy Installations Command (CNIC) on all Navy installations in the continental U.S.

"Pax River joins Navy bases across the region and country in training to protect our personnel and mission from possible attack," said NAS Patuxent River Commanding Officer Capt. Mark Zematis. "Of note is that the scale of this year's CSSC exercise is expected to be bigger than the previous year, but our Security and Emergency personnel will try to mitigate impact to the base. Even so, traffic delays should be expected by all on base."

Citadel Shield, which occurs the first week, is the field training exercise portion led by CNIC. Solid Curtain occurs the following week and is the command post exercise led by USFFC. This two-part approach was designed to enhance the readiness of

Navy security forces and ensure seamless interoperability among the commands, other services and agency partners in order to protect life, equipment and facilities.

CSSC26 is a regularly scheduled exercise and is not being held in response to any specific threat. Measures have been taken to minimize disruptions within local communities and to normal base operations, but there may be times when the exercise causes increased traffic around bases or delays in base access. Brief gate closures are expected at NAS Patuxent River during the exercise. Area residents may also see or hear security activities associated with the exercise. Advanced coordination has taken place with local law enforcement and first responders.

Base residents and personnel are reminded to avoid posted exercise areas.

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# Town Reacts to Criticism Over APF Funds

The Town of Leonardtown has reacted to criticism that they aren't doing enough to help fund monies for school construction. Public criticism recently came from both the Board of Education and County Commissioner Mike Hewitt. They charge that the town isn't collecting Adequate Public Facilities funds from developers in the growing town to help defray the cost of the schools needed for those developments.

Town Administrator Laschelle McKay explained the town is doing everything they can to gather fees from developers but the funds need to be dedicated to the schools.

McKay told the County Times, "From when I came to work here the town has always collected the school portion of the impact fee. In 2023, the county decided to go with the excise tax so that they could have more flexibility with the funds they were collecting. The impact fee has to be put aside specifically for growth related projects, and they wanted to have more flexibility with that. So, they went to the legislators and got legislative authority to change to the excise tax instead of impact fee. Our ordinance is to collect the school portion of the impact fee only. We didn't ever collect the roads or the parks and recs fees that they had previously because we pay for our own

streets, roads, and parks."

She said now "anybody who gets a building permit outside of the Town, Land Use and Growth Management (LUGM) director has the final authority, and we don't. We have our own planning and zoning authority. We don't go through LUGM. I'm very clear that Leonardtown wasn't considered for this. So, when they stopped collecting an impact fee, we had to stop collecting an impact fee because we had nowhere to send the money."

She indicated, "At that time, I started trying to work with the school board to see if we could direct it directly to the school board."

There doesn't appear to be a mechanism for the town to send the monies directly to the schools. It has to go through the county. They are still working on a mechanism to do that. At the Jan. 15 school board meeting, Superintendent of Schools Dr. J. Scott Smith recognized the town's willingness to provide school funding and said it was still being worked out.

McKay said, "We're working together and he (Smith) went back to the school board and informed them that what had been stated was not necessarily what was happening."

McKay explained, "When a town annexes property, anyone in town still pays their full county tax bill. They pay their fire, rescue, and support solid waste.

All of that is still charged to them. And

then in addition pay the town tax. So, they're still footing their bill.

"As far as streets and roads, yes, our people drive on county roads and county people drive on town roads. They use our parks. We use the county parks. We have our own contract with Waste Management for trash collection and all residents in town get trash collection. So, we're footing our own bills, and we believe that just the school fee is what we should be responsible for, which we have been trying to start collecting again."

McKay said in meetings with Hewitt and county officials she told them, "We've been trying to, but we don't want it to go to the general fund. Mr. Hewitt stated that the commissioners know better how to spend the money than putting it in separate funds. And that's not how the town feels. We feel that if we collect a school impact fee, it needs to be set aside for the school."

McKay said, "In the meantime, the council has said that they're willing to institute the school fee. We're going to start that process and we'll put it into a fund just like we collect a water impact fee and a sewer impact fee, and we use it just for those growth-related projects in those departments. We'll collect the school fee and once we work with the school board and have a way to send it to the school board for capital projects, then we'll do that. But we'll set it aside if we have to on our own. I don't know what the county

is going to pursue, but they would have to go back to the legislators to try to have them change the authority to include the town. Some counties do include the municipalities, but ours was not written that way."

McKay said, "One thing that's really important is \$6.5 million of county property tax comes from just the residents assessed in town."

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# Hope Mixed with Many Fears Dominate Public Comment On Piney Point Facility

## OAG Plans to Address Concerns Later This Week

Relief that the old Stuart Petroleum terminal in Piney Point is finally being transformed to other uses is mixed with much trepidation about what is to come. That is what has been expressed by neighbors of the property that was purchased last fall by Offshore Aviation Group (OAG), a Maryland-based defense contractor that has had offices in St. Mary's County for almost 10 years.

At last week's Commissioner's of St. Mary's County public forum, the repurposing of the property was the second-most-talked-about subject after the proposed Hollywood cannabis plant. OAG has already begun the transformation of the 320-acre parcel from a petroleum products delivery and storage facility into what they call, "a world-class center for unmanned systems development, testing, and operations, restoring the site's proud aviation and maritime heritage while positioning St. Mary's County as a global leader in next-generation technology," according to an OAG press release.

Removal of old petroleum storage tanks has already begun, and residents have reported seeing increased drone activity in the area. It has not been confirmed if that activity is related to OAG.

At the January 13th public forum in Leonardtown, several Piney Point residents expressed their worry about OAG's plans to re-activate an old aviation runway, plans to create a seaplane base along the Potomac River or along Piney Point Creek, and potential environmental harm from fiber optic lines that are sometimes used to control unmanned aerial vehicles (UAV's).

"Fiber optic cable controls for UAVs are very likely to be environmentally unfriendly," Thomas Haine, of Tall Timbers, told the commissioners at the forum. "They may entangle sea life and will contaminate the neighboring area."

Several other speakers expressed similar belief that such fiber optic lines are subject to winds and current, and will be difficult or impossible to recover after testing. Shore erosion, the impacts of UAV flights on wild-fowl and other wildlife, noise from manned aircraft using both the runway and proposed seaplane landing zones, the safety of kayakers and boaters who use Piney Point creek for recreation, and increased road traffic from potential future tenants of OAG at the facility were all brought forth as concerns.

Kurt Engle of Tall Timbers, who said he is active with the homeowner's association at the Landings at Piney Point, summed up a variety of issues. "We are supportive of the redevelopment of the oil terminal," he read from prepared remarks, "but strongly oppose the creation of an airport and a seaplane base next door to our homes, and the use of fiber optic command and control lines for the OS (operating systems) to be built and tested. Our issue with the airport is that the planned runway is only 1500 feet from our neighborhood. Winds in our area are

predominantly from the north-northwest direction much of the year. With normal general aviation operations, this would have the operations of the planned airport taking off towards our neighborhood and over many homes at slow speed and full power setting. We did not move here to be under the flight path of an airport."

In November, OAG hosted a public informational session about their new venture at the Piney Point Lighthouse Museum. There, company CEO Robert Hicks outlined plans for the facility and answered some concerns. A September press release noted that OAG would be completely removing storage tanks and removing the pipeline that essentially made Piney Point Creek a lagoon, reopening it to boaters.

"There was a lot of information (at the November meeting) that was presented," said Larry O'Brien, the vice president of the St. Mary's River Watershed Association, who spoke at last Tuesday's forum. "But it probably raised about as many questions as it answered. And there was a lot that was vague about it. And, you know, so now I'm hearing that some of the plans have changed. Now they're going to be keeping some of the storage tanks."

O'Brien, who said he lives near the OAG property, expressed the dichotomy of thoughts about OAG's intentions. "We really love the idea that these storage tanks are going to be eliminated," he said "and that was kind of my buy-in to the whole thing... that thank God somebody has come along that's going to solve that problem because it (leftover fuel tanks) could be an environmental catastrophe if it's not addressed at some point. However, what's really missing is information."

O'Brien told the commissioners that, "I think it's really your obligation as county commissioners to get the information and present it in a complete manner to the public."

The County Times emailed Paul Teas, a vice president with OAG who is listed as the media contact for OAG's Piney Point venture, and asked for clarification on the questions brought forth by Larry O'Brien and

others. He responded via email on Tuesday, saying OAG will issue a press release "at the end of the week that will address most if not all of these questions."

St. Mary's County Commissioner Eric Colvin, who lives nearby in Valley Lee and represents the Piney Point area, told the County Times via email yesterday morning that, "OAG appears to really be trying to be

a good neighbor. I know they have already been active in the area for almost a decade and they have good established partnerships with other organizations in the area."

"The environmental cleanup of the site is something that has needed to happen for years," Colvin wrote, "so I am glad that is going to finally move forward—I do not know the details of that, but my understanding is that it is a condition of the sale of the property to OAG. Safety is always the number one concern, and I look forward to hearing more about OAG's plans in the future. They have said that their goal is to help protect the airspace so that it is safe for the area and for the work they do. The business that OAG is in is a rapidly changing business, and they are on the cutting edge and it meshes well with the work already being done in the area. I am confident they are not going to leave fiber optic lines strewn about the area."

Colvin further expressed confidence that OAG's takeover of the property will be a positive experience for St. Mary's County. "OAG has a large piece of property that they can work with, and the timelines of future business endeavors are not clear, but I do believe they are trying to honestly be good neighbors and be forthright with the community."



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# School Board Receives Superintendent's Proposed Budget Includes \$9 Million Increase

The St. Mary's County Board of Education was scheduled to go to public hearing on Jan. 19 (after press deadline) on a proposed Superintendent's Budget of \$307.1 million, which is \$9 million more than the current fiscal year's budget. The proposal calls for all of the increase to come from the county.

Chief Financial Officer Tammy McCort explained the budget to the school board at their Jan. 14 meeting. McCort explained that every line item of the budget has an 18-digit code which helps identify costs.

The code includes fund number, category, program, location number (school or department), project number, account number (10 for unrestricted fund), group (for example salaries and wages), and salary.

School Superintendent Dr. J. Scott Smith said, "People keep on saying things like, you need to be transparent. Well, this is transparent. That doesn't mean it's not complex, right? So, every single time we spend funds in St. Mary's County Public Schools, it's tracked back to an account number. That account number is 18 digits long, and it tells you the fund, category, program, location, project, and then ultimately the account."

He added, "We have a lot of very well-meaning souls outside of St. Mary's County Public Schools and outside of probably St. Mary's, who start talking about we want things to be transparent. We want things to be transparent. We send up reports, we send all this information. If you don't open your eyes, nothing is transparent. So, we want to make sure that everybody understands that there is absolutely a methodical system to the way we spend every single penny. Every single penny is accounted for all the way back. And ultimately, a person who wishes to take the time to do their homework coming forward with a question about something, we have a voluminous answer for everything."

He added, "Elected official, I really wish you would do a little homework on that end before you start making wide statements about how we're spending our money."

McCort said the negotiated agreement nets an \$8.5 million increase of which "the total cost of Steps is \$4.7 million. The Cola per the negotiated agreement for all three bargaining units totals \$3.5 million."

The Instructional category is the largest, McCort said. It has a \$3.4 million or 3.3 percent increase. "This represents funding for negotiations, the addition of three athletic trainers, the reduction of positions of 6.5 teachers due to enrollment decline, four paraeducators due to enrollment decline, one reallocation, two, concentration of poverty, and two and a half positions that were reallocated in the current fiscal year to the Department of Special Education."

She said, "Our budget priority is certainly on transportation, focus on our contracted bus driver attendant wage increases, bus driver retention stipend, and contract increases to include PVA operations and maintenance."

The board was told by Smith and McCort that the cost to implement the Blueprint for Special Education and Transportation has a \$1.6 billion shortfall statewide.

McCort said of the proposed budget, "It does reflect an increase request from the county government of \$9.5 million for a total of \$146.9 million or 6.9 percent increase in local county funding. It includes an estimated state aid amount of \$148.2 million, representing an increase of \$1.6 million, a decrease in federal funds tied to impact aid to \$1.6 million and other funding sources of \$3.7 million, totaling \$300.6 million or \$10.4 million increase in recurring components of the unrestricted fund budget."

McCort summed it up by telling the board, "You can clearly see categorically that it lines with your budget priorities, particularly with the instructional salaries and wages representing the largest increase of \$3.4 million as well as special education representing a 1.6 percent increase and student transportation (at) \$1 million increase and fixed charges at \$2 million increase. Again, overall total increase of \$9 million."

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
